Hunters Use Airplane to Bag Coyotes in Oregon

BURNS, Ore., July 11—(AP)—Roe Davis and William Stephenson sat down to rest today after a 10-day coyote hunt by airplane. The two fliers, hired by Harney county sheepmen to ride the range of predators, bagged 90 animals along the sagebrush stretches of Harney county. The pelts will be sold to furriers.

Davis, the pilot, flew at straining level; and Stephenson potted the coyotes with a 12-gauge shotgun as the plane swooped past within 20 feet of the ground. The hunt is easy—comparatively—on the open desert. But in the Harney county lands, the Burns aviators said, coyotes melt into the sagebrush. Harney county sheepmen estimated \$40,000 loss last year from sheep killed by coyotes.

Big Vote Expected at Washington Primary

SEATTLE, July 11—(AP)—Spirited contests over nominations for governor, U. S. senator and the first district (Seattle-Bremerton) seat in congress were expected to draw 500,000 out of 800,000 registered voters to the Washington polls in today's primary election.

Gov. Arthur B. Langlie, republican, is the only major office incumbent facing a challenge for renomination. Louis Wasmer, Spokane radio station owner, has made an aggressive campaign against the governor.

Pet Skunks Accompany Boy on Bond Sales Tour

WASHINGTON, July 11—(AP)—Four pet skunks have helped 13-year-old J. Golder secure war bond pledges totaling \$80,000 during the Fifth war loan drive.

Joe takes the skunks with him one at a time on his house-to-house tour in his neighborhood. He says they have an appealing way about them.

Chinese Launch Drive on Japs in Southern Hupeh

CHUNGKING, July 10—(AP)

Chinese troops have launched a large-scale offensive in southern Hupeh province, making considerable progress against designated objectives, the Chinese high command announced tonight, without disclosing the area of the new drive.

This push was probably diversionary, to prevent further reinforcement of the Japanese in Hunan province to the south, where bloody fighting still continued in the suburbs of Hengyang.

A communique declared several hundred Japanese were killed south of Liling, 75 miles northeast of Hengyang, where the Chinese sought to penetrate the invaders' flank and strike his overland supply lines.

A Japanese column trying to push northward from Canton has been pressed farther back, the high command declared, but it admitted loss of Tsingyun, 40 miles northwest of Canton. It also disclosed Japanese capture June 29 of Tolshan, 80 miles southwest of Canton, the former home of many Chinese living in the United States.

Despite stiff enemy resistance, Chinese troops are tightening a noose on Japanese forces on the outer fringe of Hengyang, 200 miles north of the Canton-Hankow railroad, the Chinese high command said yesterday.

The Japanese to the east, west and north of Hengyang were fighting desperately to stave off Japs at their long vulnerable supply lines, threatened from either side. Chinese columns previously were reported to have broken into the town from the south to relieve Chinese troops who had held out during a 12-day siege.

G. O. P. Now United, Former Chairman Assures Dewey

ALBANY, N. Y., July 11—(AP)—Harrison E. Spangler, former chairman of the republican national committee, after conferring today with Governor Thomas E. Dewey, declared that the republican party is "more united than it has been in years."

Spangler, now counsel to the republican national committee, said he discussed organizational matters with the party's presidential nominee, adding:

"I gave him the situation as I see it in the various states in a general way."

Spangler declined to make any prediction on the outcome of the election, asserting "I'm not a prognosticator." He described as "somewhat indicative" an independent poll released today which reported Dewey as having a four per cent edge over President Roosevelt in New York state.

A reported asked: "If New York goes republican would this mean a republican victory?" Spangler replied, "that is an old saw, although it is not as true this year as in other times because other states have gained in population."

Gen. Vandergrift's Son Wounded in Saipan Battle

WASHINGTON, July 11—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Alexander A. Vandergrift, commandant of the marines, was notified yesterday that his son, Lt. Col. A. A. Vandergrift, Jr., marines, has been wounded in action on Saipan.

Young Vandergrift, 33, was shot in the leg while leading an infantry battalion June 28.

He previously had participated with the 4th marine division in the assaults in the Marshall islands last February.

\$12,000 Fire Sweeps Farm Near Portland

PORTLAND, July 11—(AP)—Damage from a fire which razed two buildings and agricultural equipment on the Cosmo Spada truck farm last night was estimated today at \$12,000.
