## 1,000 American Bombers Smash Munich Again

LONDON, July 13—(AP)—Munich was hit a hard blow for the third successive day by 1,000 Flying Fortresses and Liberators today while the 15th air force in Italy again stabbed at Nazi oil and rail facilities in northern Italy. Saarbrücken in western Germany also was hit by the heavies from England.
