## APRICOT JAM RECIPE SAVES SUGAR, FRUIT

Make It This Quick, Easy Way

- 4 Cups Ground Fruit
- 6 Cups Sugar
- 2 1/2 Cup Lemon Juice
- 1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash and pit 4 pounds fully ripe apricots, grind. Do not peel. Measure exactly 4 level cups of the ground fruit (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let the boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

## Beavers Blank Seals in Second Straight Win

The Portland Beavers blanked the San Francisco Seals, 4-0, last night for their second straight win in the home park and in so doing knocked the Seals out of first place in the league standings.

Meanwhile, the Seattle Rainiers, opening their home series with a double header with Oakland muffed a chance to return to the league lead by dropping both ends of the double header by scores of 3-2 and 1-0.

The double loss dropped Seattle from second to third behind the Seals, while the Oakland Aacorns jumped into first by virtue of a 3-0 victory over San Diego.

In the league's other series, last place Sacramento clipped Los Angeles for a double win, 6-1 and 3-1, and tightened the league scramble to only four games top to bottom.

In the Portland game, the Beavers were helped by three San Francisco errors in the second inning when they put the game on ice with two runs. They added singles in the fifth and eighth.

Pitcher Roy Helsler, hurling his fifth shutout of the season, limited the Seals to five hits.

Airtight baseball all the way featured both Hollywood's one-run victories in Seattle. In the first game, scheduled for seven innings, the Stars won in the ninth when Frank Kelleher scored after hitting a double. In the second game Del Jones doubled and scored on Les Power's single in the fourth for the only tally of the game. Carl Fischer, Seattle hurler, held the Stars to four hits in the second game, one less than the Rainiers collected, but still lost. Fischer issued one base on balls, the only one in both games.
