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Former Oregon Boy Stops Jap Attack With His Helmet

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 14 (AP)—When all the ammunition for his automatic rifle and his submachine gun was gone...

He has been awarded the distinguished service cross for extraordinary heroism in action...

The citation accompanying the decoration tells what happened on July 28, 1943, near Bolso, New Guinea...

"When an infantry company encountered a large enemy force in a well-organized perimeter and took a stand on the top of a ridge to hold the ground gained until reinforcements arrived...

"He found two wounded men in a position adjacent to the attacked area. After aiding in evacuating them, he returned to prevent a possible enemy breakthrough.

"Enemy troops were massed in a gully only five yards from his position. He directed automatic rifle fire at the enemy position until his ammunition was exhausted...

"By his daring, Sergeant DeWitt forestalled an enemy breakthrough and prevented heavier casualties and possible loss of the position."

U. S. Casualties Are Approaching Last War Total

WASHINGTON, July 14 (AP)—Announced American battle casualties in the present war are approaching the total casualties incurred in the first World War.

A total of 187,028 army casualties announced today by Acting War Secretary Patterson brought to 235,411 the overall total of officially announced casualties on the ground, in the air and at sea.

WE wonder what justification for their position can be found by those few eastern clergymen who recently protested allied bombings of Germany...

We need waste no sympathy upon a nation which loosed poison gas in the last war and initiated the practice of indiscriminate bombing of civilian populations...

Germany has used terror as an instrument of war. The blitzkrieg in the early days of the war was more successful because of the fear instilled into the minds of prospective enemies...

Germany woefully miscalculated the American spirit when it attempted to frighten this country into remaining neutral.

The fact that the nazis depend so largely upon terror as an instrument of warfare is a hint as to their own craven spirit.

The nazi yellow streak is now stirring intense hatred among our own forces participating in the invasion of the continent. American G. I. Joes are complaining against taking prisoners the nazis who fire from sniper posts and hidden machine gun nests...

The idealism of the American and the British people is a handicap in fighting this war. Most Americans relish a good sportsmanlike fight, but we brand as a coward the man who will strike a fallen opponent...

We need more realism and less idealism in our attitude toward our enemies. Sympathy is wasted upon people who look upon such emotion as a sign of weakness and cowardice and who know only the law of "might makes right."

The axis powers have set out to rule the world by force. They are willing to use any means to accomplish that end. The only defeat they can understand is a defeat brought about by greater firepower and greater terror than they can muster.

There is no reason in an argument which would weaken our offensive. You can't control a mad dog by patting him gently on the head.

The army casualties announced today include 33,240 killed; 77,499 wounded; 38,142 missing and 38,197 prisoners.

The navy list is composed of 26,362 killed; 14,127 wounded; 9,433 missing and 4,361 prisoners.

In Italy, army casualties since the landing last September amount to 70,399 through July 3, an increase of 5,407 since the report covering the period through June 15. Of the total 12,655 were killed, 47,457 wounded and 10,287 missing.
