Elliott Stresses Education Needs

Paul Elliott, new principal of the Roseburg senior high school, stated Thursday noon at the meeting of the Roseburg Rotary club that some seven hundred fifty thousand young men were detained in military training for twelve weeks while being taught the fundamentals of a third grade education. Mr. Elliott explained the tremendous value of education in both the social and economic life of America. He pointed out that money invested in education of American youngsters was returned many times, both from a financial and moral point of view.

Preceding the main program, introduced by Earl Wiley, chairman of the program committee, the club elected H. T. Carstens as vice-president. This special election was necessary due to the election of Ray B. Hampton to the presidency last week. J. V. Lone also was elected to fill a vacancy on the board of directors.

An announcement was made of the coming visit of the district governor, William D. Shannon, civil engineer, of Seattle, to Roseburg, August 10. Mr. Shannon will be the principal speaker of that day and will also hold a club assembly meeting at 7:30 at the Umpqua hotel.

Japs Say Powerful U. S. Fleet Still Prowling

NEW YORK, July 14—(AP)—The radio Tokyo said today that a powerful United States fleet "is still wandering around" the Marianas and that carrier planes are daily raiding "our islands in the South Seas."

The broadcast reported by the federal communications commission, said 60 planes raided Guam yesterday and that "two or three enemy warships also shelled the island."

The Japanese reported last night that an American battleship had bombed Japanese positions on Guam twice yesterday, cooperating with a large formation of planes.
