ernment." And, he said, "that we will succeed in restoring government that is close to the people I have no doubt."

(4) Senator Harry S. Truman of Missouri reiterated at Kansas City that he does "not want the vice presidency." Governor Kerr, who also has been mentioned as a possible choice, although not as frequently as Truman, said at Chicago that he is not candidate.

(5) Senator Hatch (D-N. M.) said at Washington that he does not fear a clear-cut issue between democrats and republicans on foreign policy but that "I am afraid of no issue, of a weak vacillating program, if both parties and their top men are afraid to take determined stands."

The Wallace followers had included both Barkley and Truman, along with war Mobilization Director James P. Byrnes and House Speaker Sam Rayburn, as opponents for whom they expected campaigns, but they named Justice William O. Douglas as the supreme court as their man's chief rival.

southern approaches to Japan." Salpan is a thousand miles closer to Japan than Pearl Harbor is to California.

16,000 Japs Buried

Troops mopping up the island also captured Manigassa island, lying in Salpan's important Tanapag harbor. They buried 16,000 Japanese and had many more to inter. More prisoners were taken. Japanese driving down the Hankow-Canton railway again encircled Hengyang, resuming the siege three days after the Chinese broke it July 7. The bombed, blasted city still held out but the enemy apparently was putting increased aerial pressure into the offensive to slice China in two.

Tokyo radio said its fliers were using airfields at Changsha and Hengyang, forcing U. S. airmen to withdraw to bases 600 miles away.

of Warsaw and 100 miles east of Brest Litovsk.

Action Is Boiling

By these accounts, action was boiling on 600 miles of the Russian front, from near the Baltic sea to Luck, which lies 210 miles southeast of Warsaw and 110 miles south southwest of Pinsk.

Moscow said various of the five attacking army groups had plunged within 28 miles of Kauras in Lithuania, within 60 miles of the Grodno fortress on the Bug river, and within 21 miles of the East Prussia-Riga railroad over which two German armies in the Baltic states must be supplied or else evacuated in large part.

Moscow said there were 8,000 dead Germans. Another 5,000 plodded wearily eastward to prison cages. The German commander asserted that the Wilno garrison after five days siege "broke through the soviet ring of encirclement according to orders and fought its way to German stations west of Wilno."

Reds on Offensive

Save for the capture of Kowel,

between Pinsk and Luck, the Russians have said nothing of offensive actions below the Pripyat marshes. Customarily, Moscow holds its tongue while new offensives develop.

Grodno is on the trunk railway from Wilno to Warsaw and is 160 miles northeast of the Polish capital. It lies 42 miles from the pre-war boundary of East Prussia, but only 20 as the frontier was fixed in the fourth partition of Poland by Russia and Germany early in the war.

tinuing his strenuous daily tours. Returning late Wednesday, he admitted he felt tired and told his son, Capt. Quentin Roosevelt, that "the old machine is pretty well worn down." Quentin, an officer in the first infantry division, returned to his post only two hours before the general died.

Henry T. Gorrell, representing the combined American press, said in a dispatch from Normandy that Roosevelt was in one of the first waves to hit the beach-

es of Cherbourg peninsula on D-day, and was the first general to land.

"He emerged with only a slight scratch on his left thumb," the correspondent said. "With him was his aide, Lt. Marcus O. 'Stevie' Stevenson, son of the governor of Texas."

"Roosevelt, veteran of famous battles of World War 1 and carrying many decorations including three purple hearts since Pearl Harbor, inspired the troops as he

waded ashore under an intense German artillery barrage.

"He personally directed the preliminary stages of the battle, keeping the doughboys on the move to gain as much territory as possible in the initial seaborne assault. He carried a .45 strapped to his shoulder and negotiated the tricky dunes with the help of a small bamboo cane with a spike in the end. He wore coveralls and leggings and a steel helmet with one star."
