Southerners Start Drive to Head Off Wallace, Despite FDR's Wishes; Willkie Noncommittal as to Dewey

(By the Associated Press)

A drive by southern democrats to consolidate opposition to Henry A. Wallace behind a single vice presidential candidate moved forward today despite President Roosevelt's reported personal desire to team up again with his 1940 running mate.

Gessner T. McNarney, chairman of the Alabama state democratic executive committee, who sought the support of party chairmen in 14 states below the Mason and Dixon line, reported from Mobile that "a number" of this group agreed "100 per cent" with his proposal that they unite behind "a strong southerner."

Indorsing the idea of consolidation, Virginia's national committeeman E. R. Combs thought "it would be fine" if southern states would get together on a candidate but not "necessarily a southerner."

FDR's Wishes Awaited
Meanwhile, democrats awaited official confirmation of reports President Roosevelt has written National Chairman Robert E. Hannegan expressing his personal preference for Wallace as second man on the ticket in his fourth term campaign, while asserting a disinclination to "dictate" to the convention.

Wendell L. Willkie, 1940 G. O. P. standard bearer, who congratulated Gov. Thomas E. Dewey upon his presidential nomination

after criticizing the party's foreign plank, still refused to say what he will do in the election.

Leaving a conference with Dewey at Albany yesterday, Rep. Charles Halleck of Indiana, chairman of the republican congressional campaign committee, who placed Willkie's name in nomination four years ago, said he hadn't seen the 1940 nominee but "my view is he will support the ticket." Willkie, in New York, laughingly commented that he has not "had a talk with Charlie in two years."

Barkley Still Talked
Efforts continued in behalf of a flock of vice presidential mentionables, including Senators Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky; Harry S. Truman of Missouri and Joseph C. O'Mahoney of Wyoming; House Speaker Sam Rayburn, Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas and War Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes.

Senator Claude Pepper, Florida new deal supporter, proposed a 300-word platform making clear that "we will join up with our allies after this war" and not "betray the dead as we did after the other war."

Halleck predicted "tremendous" middle west support for Dewey and asserted the nominee would coordinate the republican presidential and congressional campaigns.

WASHINGTON, July 15—(AP)—The possibility that courts martial may be organized before Dec. 7 for the trials of Rear Admiral Husband E. Kimmel and Maj. Gen. Walter C. Short was suggested today in informed military quarters.

The appointment yesterday of special boards to inquire into the circumstances of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor was followed by reports that Courts martial might be convened to begin the formal trials by taking the pleas of the two officers, then recessing until after the war.

Doe and Cow Elk Tags Must Be in by Aug. 1
PORTLAND, July 14—(AP)—The state game commission warned today that applications for cow elk and doe deer hunting tags must be filed by August 1. Drawings will be held if applications outnumber the tags to be issued, the commission said. Three thousand doe deer tags will be issued for the October 1-31 open season in a limited area of Grant and Baker counties. Five hundred tags are authorized for antlerless elk taken in Weneha area of northeastern Oregon from November 1-30, and 300 tags

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
