

Olympia Supply And Sutherland Win Ball Games

The Olympia Supply company team defeated Dunham's Dubs, 4 to 3, last night in a contest which resembled a debate rather than a softball game. Several close situations developed involving careful study of the rule books and creating prolonged arguments. Dunham's had the potential winning run on third base in the last inning when Fred Scherner came to bat. He had poled out a home run earlier in the contest and, with first base unoccupied, the decision was made to put him on first base, but Scherner took a swing at a wide ball and drove out a hit scoring a run which would have tied the score, but after the argument it was held that he had stepped out of the batter's box to hit the wide pitch and thus automatically made the third out.

The game, however, failed to count in team standings, as a revision in schedules has been forced by the withdrawal of the Roseburg Alloys from the league. The lineup of Baughman's team has been riddled by inductions for military service and remaining players are being divided among the other teams, thus strengthening the entire league.

In the second game last night the Sutherland Caribous won a 7 to 1 victory from Youngs Bay Lumber company. Vang, Sutherland pitcher, yielded only five scattered hits and was never in trouble until the last inning, when the Lumbermen scored their lone run. Home runs by Cox and Rice, each driving in an extra run, contributed to the Sutherland victory.

Postponed games will be made up next week, and the first half of the season standings will be based upon each team playing two games with each other team in the league. The change from six to five teams will force revision of the schedule for the second half of the season.

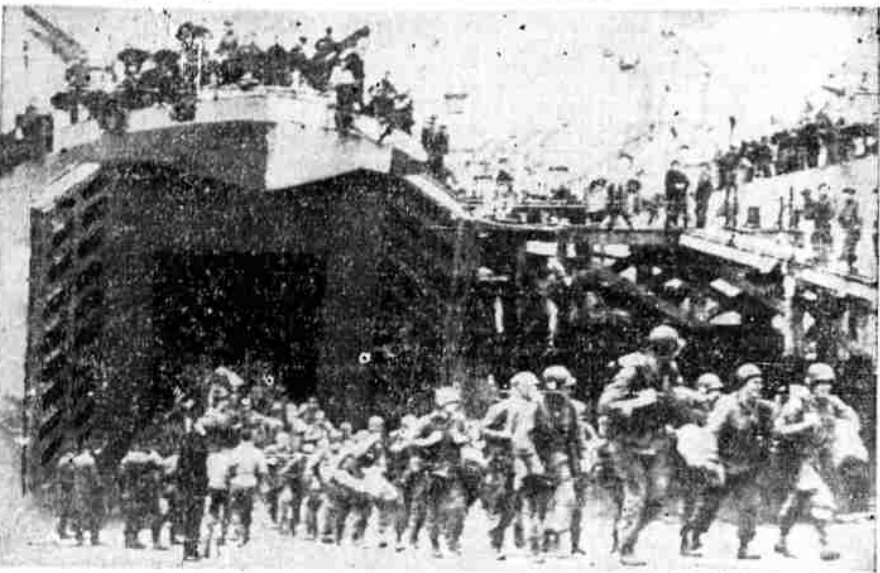

Mothers of America's Fighter Aces Meet



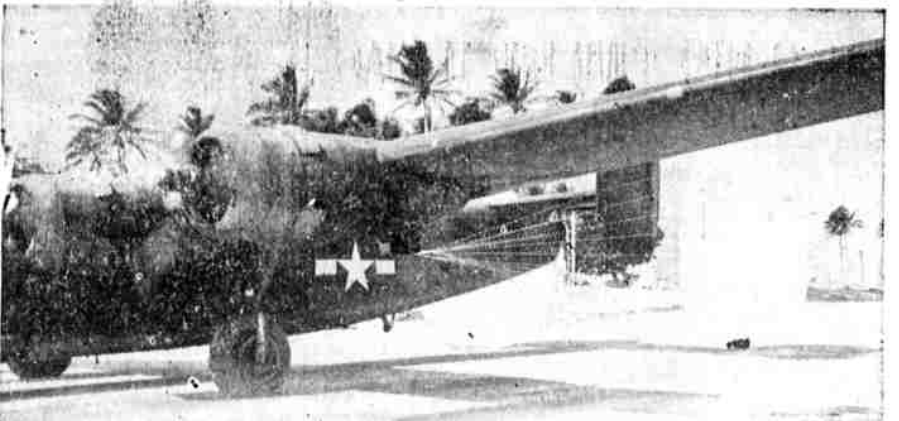

Nazis Grimly Facing Fight on Own Soil

and East Prussia with Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia.

This was one of the most dangerous thrusts for the Germans of the whole current campaign, for while the railway is not the only line left out of Latvia and Estonia, it is a main line over which virtually all military traffic moves.

LONDON, July 15—(AP)—The Germans announced today that the Russians have launched a long-awaited offensive in southern Poland—extending to 500 miles a front which in the north challenges the last-ditch string of forts guarding the junker homeland in East Prussia, now less than 20 miles ahead of the red army.

Reds Strike Hard

The German high command said the Russians struck from northwest of Tarnopol, where they last were reported within 30 miles of strategic Lwow, and west of Luck, 120 miles southeast of Lublin, which guards the southeast approaches to Warsaw.

A drive from Luck also would pose a southern flanking threat to Brest-Litovsk, fortress town scarred by two wars, which stands on the main line west to Warsaw and anchors the enemy's Bug river defenses.

"Some Russian penetrations were eliminated in counter-thrusts," the Berlin radio said of the new offensive.

Moscow, habitually silent on new operations until they are well developed, had not mentioned any new drive south of the Pripyat marshes.

reports indicated British forces had withdrawn from hill 112 north of Esquay, scene of many bitter battles.

Allied air forces recorded destruction of 27 German planes, against a loss of 14, with bad weather holding individual plane flights to about 1,000.

The capture of Lessay, Periers and St. Lo would free the narrow bottleneck of the Cherbourg peninsula and give the allies greater freedom of movement behind their own lines. All these towns are connected by a lateral highway.

While the Germans undoubtedly will defend Periers and Lessay on a house-to-house basis, there appears little doubt that these defenses will be only rear-guard actions, coupled with a similar stand along the river Ay which now is flooded.

British troops have captured more than 7,000 Germans and killed or wounded four times as many—28,000 to 30,000—since D-day, a British staff officer at the front declared, as a full persisted on the British-Canadian sector of the east.

The whole allied bag of prisoners was above 54,000 for an American announcement June 11 said 46,819 enemy troops had been taken by U. S. forces.

Money Allotted to County From State Highway Fund

Allotment of \$17,990.99 to Douglas county from the state motor vehicle license fund, was announced today by Robert S. Farrell Jr., secretary of state. The allotment is from a fund of \$800,000 being divided among the counties. A payment of \$1,200,000 in December will complete the year's appropriation of \$2,000,000 earmarked for aid to counties.
