Chinese Crack Jap Ring Around Canton Railway

CHUNGKING, July 19 — (AP) — Counterattacking Chinese have cracked the Japanese ring around the Canton-Hankow railway city of Hongyang, and have reached points from two to three and one-half miles from the city, where they can hear the gunfire of relief forces, the high command announced tonight.

At Leiyang on the railway, 34 miles to the south of the besieged junction, Japanese troops were said to be retreating northward. A Chinese government spokesman said the Japanese were bringing in strong reinforcements, and the battle for Hongyang on the Canton-Hankow railway was approaching a climax. "We cannot foretell the outcome" said the spokesman, P. H. Chang.
