FRESH PLUM JAM IS EASY TO MAKE

This Delicious Recipe Saves Sugar and Fruit
(Using Sour Clingstone Plums)
6 Cups Crushed Plums
8 1/2 Cups Sugar
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin
Wash and pit 3 1/2 pounds fully ripe plums. Do not peel. Cut into small pieces and crush thoroughly. Add 1 1/2 cup water and simmer, covered, for 5 minutes. Measure exactly 6 level cups of the crushed plums (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), mix well and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.
(Using Sweet or Freestone Prunes)
4 1/2 Cups Crushed Plums
7 Cups Sugar
1 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin
Sour clingstone plums make the best jam. If sweet or freestone prunes are used, be sure to use the recipe given directly above, following the same method of handling as for sour plums.

Beavers Climb to 4th Place Tie by Defeating Stars

The Portland Beavers moved into a fourth place tie with the Seattle Rainiers in the Pacific Coast Baseball league race last night as Pieretti, Beaver pitching ace, turned in his 16th victory of the season defeating Hollywood's Stars 3 to 1. The Rainiers split a pair with

the San Francisco Seals, dropping the second straight, 2-0, in the opener and then coming back to take the nightcap, 1-0, in an abbreviated session halted by rain at the end of the first half of the seventh. In the Portland game, Gullie gave Pieretti his victory when he drove in two runs in the fourth and one in the eighth, the only two innings in which the Beavers were able to connect with the offering of Escalante. At Seattle, Seal Pitcher Seats shut out the Rainiers, with three hits in the seven-inning opener, while in the second a wild pitch

let Rainier Fielder Christopher score in the fifth. At the top of the league the Los Angeles Angels moved within half a game of the leading Oakland Acoorns by taking a double-header from the San Diego Padres, 2 to 1 and 4 to 3.
