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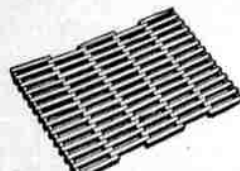

Slightly injured were these:

Generals Jodl, Hitler's personal
military aide; Karl Bodens-
chatz, aide to Hitler; Guenther
Korten, chief of staff of the Ger-
man air force; Buhle, Heusinger
and Walter Scherff.

Admirals Voss and von Put-
tkammer.

Fuehrer's 2nd Close Call

It was the second time, at least,
during the war that Hitler nar-
rowly missed death.

The first time was on Nov. 8,
1939, when a bomb exploded in
the Munich beer hall just after
the Fuehrer had left a celebration
marking his ill-fated putsch of
1923.

Hitler left the hall just nine
minutes before a time bomb ex-
ploded in a pillar of the hall near
the rostrum where he had spok-
en to his party followers. Six per-
sons were killed and more than
60 injured in the blast.

An arrest was made for the
bombing, but Berlin authorities
never announced the outcome of
their investigation. At the time
the Gestapo attempted to pin re-
sponsibility on British agents.

Disension Rife

Only yesterday, the Russian
press published a statement by the
captured commander of the 41st
German army tank corps, Lt.
Gen. Edmund Hofmeister, saying
there was grave dissent in ranks
of the German high command
with Hitler's strategy in refusing
to retreat.

The Berlin broadcasts did not
immediately name the time or
place of the bombing attempt.
Hitler has been reported spend-
ing a great deal of his time on
his eerie mountain top at Berch-
tesgaden. Hofmeister said it was
there that Hitler recently held a
conference of 150 generals and
admirals to outline his strategy.
The Hofmeister statement, as
published in Moscow, described
Hitler then as of swollen face, of
low and jumbled voice.

Disension Theorized.

Later today a source in London
with close European connections
said the incident probably oc-
curred at Breda, Holland, report-
ed to be the headquarters of Mar-
shal Rommel.

This same source, who cannot
be identified by name, said the
critical question of reserves for
the German armies on three
fronts had provoked a split be-
tween Rommel and Marshal Gen.
Guenther von Kluge, commander
of the forces in Normandy. He
speculated that the incident
might have resulted from a gen-
eral division of the German staff,
resulting in a brawl.
