## Nicotine Dust Scarcity Calls for Careful Use

**CORVALLIS, Ore., July 20.** (AP)—Scarcity of nicotine dust this year necessitates efficient use if pests are to be controlled. Dr. Don C. Mote, head of entomology at Oregon State college, warned today.  
The most efficient way to apply dust is to operate only at night or in early morning when air movement is the least. Dr. Mote said. Material is largely wasted, he said, when dusting is attempted with even a light breeze.

## New Price Ceilings on Cabbage Are Announced

L. V. Hammock, chairman of the Roseburg War Price and Rationing board, announced receipt of setting prices on new cabbage immediately effective.  
All cabbage must be sold by the pound rather than the crate. Sales in less than carload or truckload lots delivered to a retail store have a ceiling of 36 cents per pound. The ceiling to the consumer at the retail store is 5 cents a pound.

**Women, Children Used to Harvest Record Bean Crop**  
**CORVALLIS, Ore., July 21.** (AP)—With the harvest of a record-breaking acreage of snap beans in Oregon just around the corner, the state emergency farm labor office today was mobilizing forces of boys, girls and women, who will do most of the picking this season.  
A total of 4700 acres of snap beans have been planted for processing this year—400 more acres than in the \$3,000,000 harvest of 1943. In addition, some acreage has been planted for the fresh market.  
The bean harvest will begin in some areas about July 25, but the peak demand for workers will not come until about the middle of August.  
Two grade school children under proper supervision can pick as many beans as an adult man, a bean harvest labor efficiency study indicated. The study also showed that boys and girls in platoons under adult leadership picked about 1 per cent more beans than youngsters not in platoons.  
The average amount of beans picked per day by all ages was approximately 150 pounds.

A German-owned synthetic gasoline plant in Lyon, only recently equipped with new machinery and scheduled to begin production this week, was wrecked last Wednesday.

Within the last fortnight, according to dispatches direct from Vichy, at least 20 storage tanks for liquid fuel have gone up in flames in the Rhone valley and southern France. The reports here said they were fired by patriot saboteurs despite German sentries established around all such storage centers.

Coal dumps along railroad lines have been fired frequently—an operation that one fugitive, described as "not easy."

Frontier advices said in the great northern coal fields patriot miners have burned the stores of wooden beams used for shoring the mineshafts, have broken the elevators and wrecked pumping machinery, allowing the mines to be flooded.

**Bitter Quarrels Split Morale of German Forces**  
**LONDON, July 20.** (AP)—Reports of bitter quarreling among German officers, or reckless disagreement over strategy and policy, and of still another shakeup in the structure of the high command in the west, echoed from within embattled Europe today as the nazis struggled desperately in the grip of a massive three-front war.

From Germany itself, in a broadcast of DNB, official German news agency, came a report that Joseph Grobe, 42, a high officer of Hitler's elite guard, had been named "reich commissioner of the occupied territories of Belgium and northern France," replacing the military commander. The same report said an infantry general named Grase had been given military command of the area.  
In Greece, six nazi officers died in a shooting affray rising out of a quarrel during a recent conference, the Greek government announced at Cairo.

The German high command has lost more than 30 general officers, either killed or captured, since June 6. In the shift in the command of Holland and Belgium, Hitler now has turned over to the Gestapo the only area in German-occupied territory not previously governed by Quislings or political commissars.

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## French Patriots Dealing Havoc To German Supplies

**PORTBOU, Spain, July 19.** (AP)—French patriot organizations have turned their energies against the German's dwindling fuel supplies throughout France, destroying gasoline, oil and coal already stored or en route to dumps and sabotaging mines and production plants, border reports said today.  
"This is only the beginning," declared a former Vichy official who crossed this frontier to safety after the nazis identified him as being in league with the patriots. "We plan to continue until the only motive power the Germans have is their own feet"

## Hand Tools Cause Most Farm Hurts

**CORVALLIS, Ore., July 21.** (AP)—Hard tools such as axes and pitchforks are responsible for more accidents on Oregon farms than either machinery, vehicles or animals, available farm accident figures indicate.

W. A. Schoenfeld, dean of agriculture at Oregon State college, said the annual report of the state industrial accident commission places hand tools at the top of the list of causes of farm accidents for farmers operating under the workmen's compensation law. In second place were power or horse-driven vehicles, followed in order by ladders and steps, power-driven machinery, nails and slivers, animals, poisonous plants or insects, and falling, slipping flying objects.

Sprained ankles accounted for the largest number of injuries of one specific type, the report says. Lacerated fingers were second and fractured ribs third.
