

Los Angeles Goes Into Lead in Race In Coast League

(By the Associated Press)
The Los Angeles Angels climbed into the lead in the close Pacific Coast league race with a 7-6 victory over San Diego last night while the Sacramento Solons were drubbing Oakland 5-1, behind the five-hit pitching of Dreisewerd.

Oakland dropped to second and San Francisco took sole possession of third with a 2-0 win over Seattle in three days.

In fifth place, one-half game back of Seattle, was Portland which split a pair with Hollywood. The Beavers dropped an 8-2 11-inning decision in the opener but bounced over three runs in the eighth inning of the curfew-halted second contest for a 4-3 triumph.

Hollywood won the opener on a six-run rally in the 11th that saw the Portland defense fall completely apart after the Beavers' Fulford had blanked the Stars after a two-run first inning. Adams' single in the eighth drove across Portland's winning tally in the second game.

Nazis Repudiate Charge Of Killing Allied Fliers

LONDON, July 22—(AP)—German broadcasts today said the reich government had refused to communicate any further with the British on the killing of 50 British and allied fliers after being removed from German prison camps in March.

A statement broadcast by DNB said the German government "most strongly repudiates" British charges that the men were murdered.

It added that in view of "the unheard of demeanor" of British Foreign Secretary Eden in making such charges in commons before receiving any final report from Berlin, "the German government refused to make any further communication regarding the matter."

Grocery Suspended for Ration Violation

PORTLAND, Ore., July 22—(AP)—A Longview, Wash., grocery was suspended today from selling rationed goods for 60 days—or for the duration of rationing should future violations of OPA rules occur.

The firm, Rickles' grocery, was one of five found by an OPA hearing commissioner in violation of ration banking regulations.

Thirty-day suspension orders, stayed unless future violations are reported, were issued against Tex's grocery, Springfield, Ore.

been heard from since Berlin announced two days ago that Adolf Hitler had narrowly escaped assassination.

Two reports, wholly unconfirmed, indicated unrest in the German navy as well as the army.

Radio France in Algiers quoted reports from Basel that it was generally believed there that naval units at Kiel and Stettin had rebelled. The Brazzaville radio reported unrest among naval units in Norwegian ports and said an organization called "the Fraternal Association of All German Sailors" appeared to be behind the movement.

A Madrid dispatch said one report from a German embassy source there indicated certain army elements had revolted in southern Germany and that fighting still was continuing.

Labor Chief Raps Nobility
Dr. Robert Ley, Nazi labor labor chief, declared in a broadcast address this morning to German armament workers that the fact Hitler "was saved does not mean the battle is won," then added:

"While German workers labor 12 and 16 hours without a Sunday or holiday, the idle nobility has nothing better to do than plot against our Fuehrer."

Word emerged through Sweden of mass arrests in Berlin with large forces of SS (elite guard) troops ringing the capital and patrolling the streets in armored cars.

Fine Is Paid—A fine of \$10 was paid in the Roseburg Justice court today by Casey J. Morgan who pleaded guilty, Judge Thomas Hartfield reported, to operating a motor vehicle without a driver's license.

Austrians Slay German Officers, Join French

ANDORRA, Spain, July 22—(AP)—Reports reaching this Pyrennes principality from across the French border today pictured reverberations within the German radio's account of an army plot against the Nazi party.

In the Hérault department, inland from Montpellier, where several Austrian detachments were stationed, French partisans were reported to have recruited their first well-armed, German-speaking volunteers, when two companies comprising 350 Austrians shot four German SS (elite guard) commanders and deserted as units, with food, supplies and arms, to the Maquis.

Assenheimer Leader in Lower Umpqua Affairs

Fred Assenheimer, Gardiner resident, who died Wednesday at Eugene, was born November 26, 1870, in Bielefeld, Germany, and came to the United States in 1889, settling in the lower Umpqua district, where he was a prominent merchant for many years, while also operating a large farm in the Smith River district.

He was one of the founders of the Bank of Gardiner in 1914 and was vice-president and director of that bank at the time of his death. He was active in civic affairs and served as president of the Roosevelt Highway association.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Edna Assenheimer; a step-son, Major Dean L. Condon, who is

in the South Pacific; a brother, Karl Assenheimer, postmaster at Cudahy, Wis., and a sister, Fredricka Assenheimer.

100 Americans were killed at one landing beach and that "tremendous losses" had left the invading forces in "helpless disorder." The broadcast said heavy fighting was continuing.

The Japanese estimated the American landing force at a division and a half—more than 20,000 men—with 150 tanks.

Other Islands Blasted
Nimitz announced last night that Liberators, presumably based on Saipan, had bombed Chichi Jima and Haha Jima islands in the Bonin group, 600 miles south of Tokyo, without loss. They also attacked an enemy destroyer near Chichi Jima.

In China, the Japanese attacking Hengyang increased their forces to four divisions—60,000

men, and a Chungking spokesman said the Japanese had committed 150,000 troops to the Hunan campaign designed to conquer the Canton-Hankow railway.

Chinese American warplanes helped Hengyang's defenders resist the Japanese attack and also aided a Chinese relief column approaching to within a mile of the city. Monsoon rains limited activity in Burma and India.

Nutt, one. Three of the 1,176 delegates were absent.

Harmony Achieved.
The vice presidential balloting, which began on a bitter note of strife between the CIO political action committee and big-city democratic chieftains, who have had a great deal to say about party affairs in the last 12 years, ended on a publicly harmonious pitch.

But there remained a note of Dixie dissent, perhaps most clear-

ly expressed by Senator Kenneth D. McKellar of Tennessee, who arose to complain that his state's 26 votes remained to the last required for Governor Cooper.

McKellar's protest was lost in the banging of Chairman Jackson's gavel, which denied the speaker's stand earlier in the day in attempts to quell demonstrations from the galleries for Wallace, apparently touched off by CIO sympathizers.

Wallace Says He's Happy.
Wallace came up smiling today after losing the biggest battle of his political career.

"I'm happy about it—I really am," he told sympathizers who filed through his hotel suit last night.

He was happy, he explained, because he thought the fight he had made for renomination had advanced further the cause of political and economic liberalism which he espouses.

And he made it clear he would go all the way for the Roosevelt-Truman ticket this fall. If he felt that the president, by making known that Senator Truman would be acceptable as running mate, had contributed to his de-

feat, he gave no sign of it.

CIO to Back Ticket.
The CIO political action committee minimized a setback in the convention today by casting its full strength behind the Roosevelt-Truman ticket.

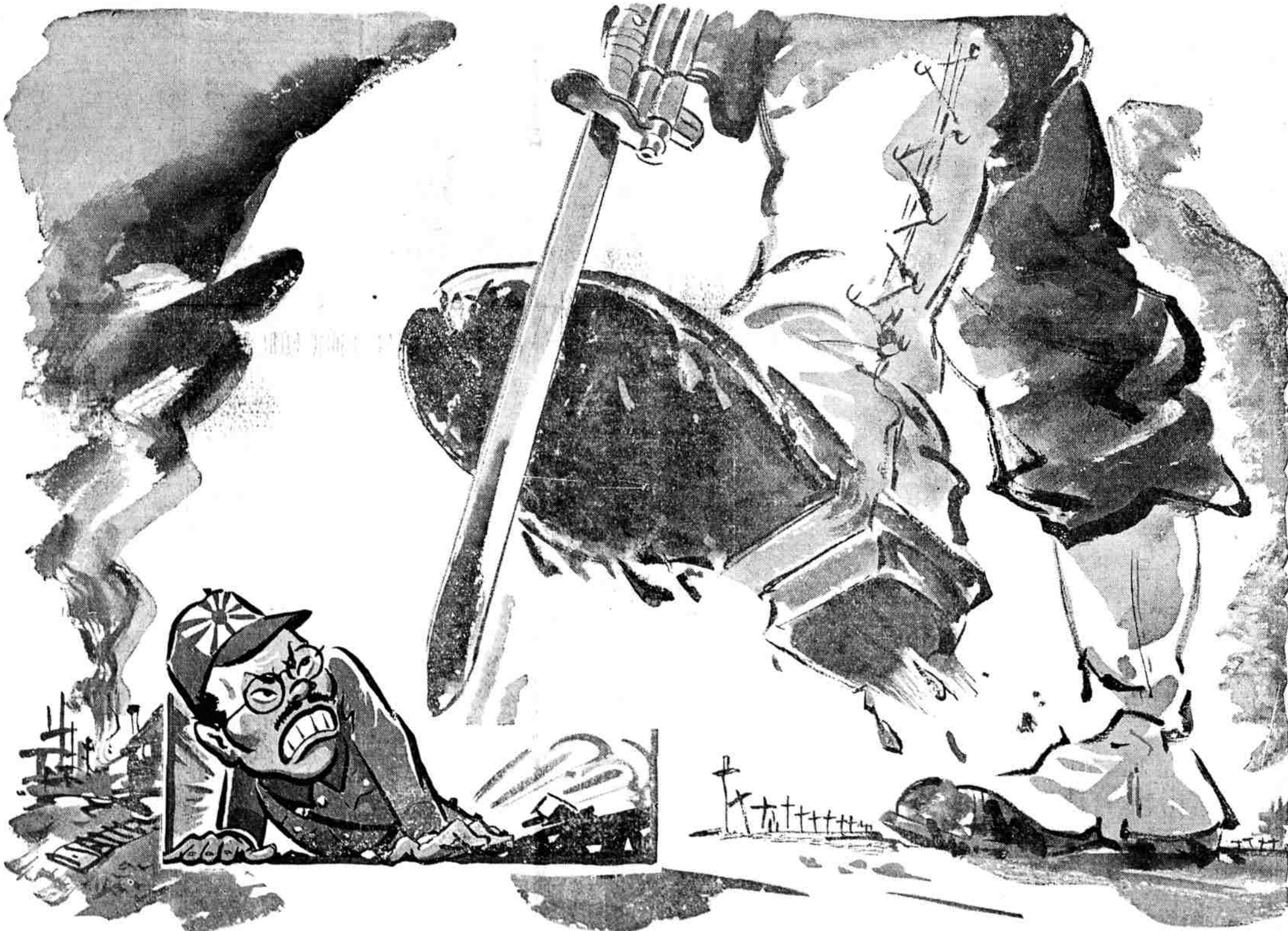
Wielding influence without precedent in a national convention, the CIO leaders nevertheless fell short of their goal—renomination of Wallace, their choice for the vice presidential spot long before the Chicago meeting and on whom they refused to trade.

Even before Senator Truman's nomination was official, Sidney Hillman, political action chairman, issued his statement that support of Wallace "did not carry with it opposition to another candidate whom the convention might select."

"We believe that Senator Truman is eminently qualified for the office of vice president. He will make a splendid running mate for the president. We are confident that Roosevelt and Truman will be the winning team on November 7. They will have our complete and wholehearted support."
