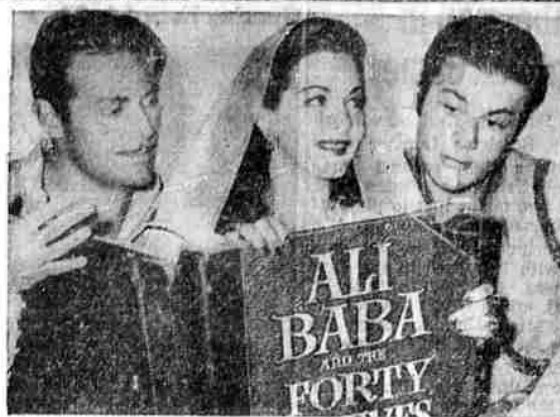

Mrs. G. N. Sheldon Passes Away Here

Mrs. Garwood N. (Mary Minerva) Sheldon, 85, a resident of Roseburg for the past 14 years, died Sunday morning at Mercy hospital following an illness of several weeks.

She was born Aug. 14, 1858, in Detroit, Mich., where she was married June 15, 1887, to Mr. Sheldon, who, four years earlier, had moved to the Pacific coast, where he was employed in construction of the union depot at Portland, later engaging in farming at Boisfort, Wash.

Following destruction of their farm home by fire in 1887, Mr. and Mrs. Sheldon moved to Seattle, where they made their home until 1930, when Mr. Sheldon was retired after 30 years of continuous service with the Seattle city street lighting department.

They moved to Roseburg in 1930, making their home with their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. D. E. Carr, and continued residence with Mr. Carr, following the death of their daughter several years ago.

Mrs. Sheldon was a member of the Methodist church. Surviving are her husband; two nieces, Irene H. and Ethel C. Ackerman, and a nephew, Frank B. Ackerman, who resides in Yreka, Calif.

Funeral services will be conducted by Dr. C. A. Edwards at the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday. The body will be taken to Seattle for interment in Evergreen cemetery.

Dixie Demos May Launch Reprisals

CHICAGO, July 22 (AP)—Mollified only by the defeat of Henry A. Wallace for the vice-presidential nomination, Dixie democrats took their city-inflicted political wounds back to the peace and quiet of the south today to decide their future role in national politics.

A rough week at the democratic national convention left some of their leaders in a militant mood and calling for an organization of southern party leaders to prevent future kick-arounds, as they put it, from their northern colleagues. Just what they would do, though, they were far from agreed on.

Some called for forthright organization of a third party built around the traditionally "solid south."

Others threatened to carry their fight into the November election—not by voting for republican Thomas E. Dewey but by supporting him indirectly through the medium of sending to the electoral college electors who would not vote for Franklin D. Roosevelt but for some other democrat, possibly Senator Harry E. Byrd of Virginia. This threat came from Texas and Mississippi democrats and it might well be a serious one if the November election should be close in northern states.

Driver Exams Scheduled

The regular weekly examinations for persons desiring licenses to drive motor vehicles will be held Wednesday, July 26, it is reported by the secretary of state. Examiner Ward McReynolds will be available to conduct tests between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 p. m., with headquarters at the Roseburg city hall.

Top Prices For Alfalfa Hay Set

Producers' maximum prices for alfalfa hay have been upped by OPA, according to information received by J. Roland Parker, county agricultural agent. Maximum price regulations now in effect provide higher ceiling prices for specified monthly periods, increases baling allowances from \$4 to \$5 a ton and permits transportation costs.

Base prices are established for all grades of unbaled alfalfa hay sold without an official certificate of grade. Ceiling prices for unbaled hay sold during May-October, \$20.50, November \$21.50, December \$21.50, and January-April \$22. With federal or state certificate of grade, U. S. No. 2 leafy \$2 a ton more than ungraded hay in same periods.

Farmers may add \$5 a ton if hay is baled.

Ceiling prices listed for alfalfa hay are producers' prices at farm. More complete information regarding producers' ceiling prices are available at the Roseburg OPA office.

WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in my judgment, a menace to life and property on account of the high fire hazard caused by an excessive number of snags and inflammable debris on the ground due to logging operations and old burns, and

WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester, it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following area designated as:

Area No. 12-P—Coos County Fire Patrol Association area: Township 22 South, Range 9 West: Secs. 19 to 36, inc.

Township 23 South, Range 9 West: Secs. 1 to 18 and 21 to 36, inc.

Township 24 South, Range 9 West: All of township.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, EARL SNELL, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 107-209, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 238, Oregon Laws 1941, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above described area to be unlawful and that said area shall be subject to entry only through permit to be issued by the State Forester, or a fire warden, under which permit entry shall

comply with any and all of the following requirements:

(a) To build no fires except in places designated as safe in said permit.

(b) To have as a part of his or her equipment tools suitable for extinguishing fire.

(c) To refrain from smoking except in places designated as safe in said permit.

This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 22nd day of July, 1944, and shall remain in full force and effect until the 31st day of December, 1944.

Done at the Capitol in Salem, Oregon, this 17th day of July, 1944.

LOOK OUT! OATS, BARLEY CEILINGS LACKING

"Oats and Barley ceilings failed to come through on Monday as the trade had anticipated. This is causing considerable confusion in the grain trade, not only here, but in other sections of the country.

"Farmers are holding their crops back, waiting for the ceilings, with the faint hope that ceilings, when announced will give them a better price. No movement of any consequence can be expected until the ceiling prices are announced and digested."

The above news item appeared in the last "Commercial Review". These ceiling prices probably will be established by O. P. A. within the next few days. As soon as O. P. A. announces the ceiling prices for the 1944 crop of oats and barley, there will have to be a revision of both buying and selling prices for these grains. Whether that revision will be up or down, nobody knows at this time.
