Celling Prices On Spuds

Ceiling prices for the 1944 potato crop have been announced by OPA as effective July 15 through the marketing season at the same level as for the 1943 crop, with a few minor exceptions. Small increases were granted a few states for the month of July due to decreased yields that followed adverse weather conditions, and July differentials for under-sized potatoes were removed.
