41st Division
Posts Great
War Record

Soldiers From Roseburg In Unit Noted for Top Ability, Clean Conduct

The 41st division, of which the company which went from Roseburg with the Oregon National guard is a part, has an outstanding reputation in the South Pacific for military efficiency, First Lieutenant Harold J. Thomas reports.

Lieutenant Thomas, who spent 27 months in Australia and New Guinea as an artilleryman, has been returned to the United States after four months in hospitals and is expecting medical discharge. He is visiting at Roseburg with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Thomas, while on leave from the hospital at Walla Walla.

"Jungle fighting is right up the alley for the boys of the Pacific northwest who make up the 41st division," Lieutenant Thomas states. "Most of them have had deer hunting and camping experience and know how to look out for themselves. Consequently the casualties have been unusually light and the health of the men is excellent, despite the fact they have spearheaded nearly all of the major campaigns."

Lieutenant Thomas was with the 41st division during the more than two years he spent overseas, but declares that his opinion is not based on his own great pride in the outfit, but on comments of high-ranking officers with whom he came in contact while stationed for a time in divisional headquarters.

Well Behaved, Popular. "The people whose sons are in the 41st have reason to be extremely proud of them, not only as soldiers but as gentlemen," Thomas said. "When the men were back in rest camp in Australia and were granted furloughs, their conduct was remarkably good. Only seven cases were brought up for punishment, while neighboring divisions had more than one hundred complaints of misconduct upon which to act."

"Our men are extremely popular with the Australians and are freely invited into homes because they behave themselves. The parents at home have no reason to worry about any misconduct on the part of their sons. They're a swell bunch of men."

The 41st division, Lt. Thomas reports, has become exceptionally proficient in amphibious operations. They have developed coordination of all departments, which makes them the quickest-moving and hardest-striking unit in the area.

"We can talk all we please about the air force, the navy, the artillery and the other branches of service," Thomas declared, "but it's the infantryman who is taking the beating in the South Pacific and our men are the best of the lot. Believe me, I'm proud of them and everyone at home should be, too."

A graduate of Roseburg high school and Oregon State college, he was employed by the forest service on the Umpqua National forest prior to being called from the reserve to active service in February, 1941. He went overseas in April, 1942. He saw combat action in the Salamaua campaign.

Negro Pug, Paralyzed, in Hospital After Battle

NEWARK, N. J., July 25—(AP)—Lem Franklin, 203-pound negro heavyweight from Chicago, was reported in critical condition today at City hospital after being

knocked out by Larry Lane, Trenton negro, in the ninth round of a scheduled ten-round fight here last night.

Dr. Herbert Conner said after examining X-rays that Franklin had a serious brain concussion and partial paralysis of the right arm and right leg. The paralysis was caused by the fighter's fall and not by punches, the doctor said.

Lane, weighing 192½, sent Franklin tottering with a right to the chin, and then knocked him senseless with a left to the chin.
