

No Redress For Liquor Stolen at Gardiner, Ruling

SALEM, Ore., July 26—(AP)—The state board of control is not authorized to pay the state liquor commission \$227 from the state restoration fund, the state's own fire insurance system, for the theft of liquor while fire destroyed the state liquor agency at Gardiner, Attorney General Neuner ruled today.

The Gardiner Tavern, which acted as the liquor agency, burned last June 15. Residents of the town removed the liquor, and walked home with \$227 worth.

Holding that the loss of the liquor was not a fire loss, Neuner wrote:

"It must be assumed that some of the citizens while assisting in saving the property... took the same and ultimately consumed it. It would thus seem that the intoxicating liquor which is missing ultimately fulfilled the purpose for which it was manufactured. The fire provided only the opportunity for the theft; it did not cause it."

"The loss... was no more by or through fire than would be damage to any other property which might conceivably result from overindulgence in the stolen liquor."

Strikes in Eastern Plants Idle 8,600

(By the Associated Press.)

Settlement of a major labor dispute at the Wright Aeronautical corporation, Lockland, Ohio, was announced by union leaders today, but other controversies kept about 8,600 idle in the eastern half of the nation. Conferences produced an agreement for reinstating suspended union officials.

An estimated 4,900 employees in three other plants in Ohio were involved in labor disputes. At Cleveland 3,000 CIO UAW workers at the Ohio Crankshaft Co. were idle in protest over discharge of two inspectors. Production of vital parts for B-29 Superfortresses engines was affected.

Also in Cleveland, 1,100 AFL UAW workers left their jobs last night at the National Malleable & Steel Castings Co., after the WLB had granted 400 of their members wage increases union officials said were smaller than had been expected in some instances.

About 800 members of eight AFL locals at the Toledo Shipbuilding Co. were idle, in protest against what union leaders called "breakdown of negotiations" on a series of grievances.

A proposal for settlement of a strike by 2,500 CIO steelworkers at the American Rolling mill plant at Ashland, Ky., was scheduled for consideration of the union local today. The walkout yesterday had forced start of a shutdown at the Clayton Lumber Steel Co., threatening to force 2,400 employees out of work.

Two strikes in Detroit, however, ended. About 900 metal polishers at the Packard Motor Car company airplane engine plant and 600 employees of five Detroit dairies, voted last night to end their walkouts. Approximately 80,000 families have been without milk deliveries for the last two weeks.

Price Limits Set For Fresh Pears

WASHINGTON, July 24—(AP)—The OPA brought fresh pears under price control for the first time today and said the action would result in retail prices about 20 per cent under those of last year.

The new prices are effective today at country shipping points. The retail schedule will be put into effect shortly.

Up to September 10, the highest retail price will be about 15 cents a pound, rising to a high of about 17 cents by next April, OPA said.

From tomorrow through September 10, the f. o. b. price for pears produced in California and the Oregon counties of Josephine and Jackson is \$3.60 a standard pear box, a "one-way lug," or two

half boxes with a net weight of not less than 46 pounds or not more than 50 pounds.

The ceiling is \$1.50 for a "Washington" pear lug with a net weight of not less than 19 pounds or not more than 21 pounds. For pears graded and packed in all other containers the price is 74 cents a pound. Prices in other areas are in line with these, OPA said.

Monthly increases based on storage charges are provided for pears sold after September 10.

A maximum wholesale markup of 2.22 cents a pound is provided, OPA said, adding that ceilings for pears delivered to wholesale receiving points in California, Oregon and Washington will be determined by adding freight charges from the shipping point as well as protective service costs.

At sales levels other than for country shipping points the effective date is staggered "so as not to disrupt the marketing of pears already in transit," OPA said.

In wholesale markets, the new schedule becomes effective July 29 in California, Oregon and Washington.

Americans Punch 4-Mile Breach in German Line

of Caen. Bitter German counterattacks forced the British to fall back to the northern exit of Tilly-La-Campagne. In the main the British and Canadians were reported holding on to their gains yesterday.

RAF Hammers Reich.
The RAF pounded many targets in Germany last night, including Stuttgart for the second successive night, Berlin, Bremen, Mannheim and Wanne-Eickel in the Ruhr. About 1,000 bombers carried out the assaults through electrical storms at a loss of 13 planes.

U. S. Lightnings and Mustangs operating from new bases in Russia helped the Russian offensive by bombing a German airfield 100 miles northwest of Lwow in Poland yesterday. At least 30 enemy aircraft were reported shot down.

Two patients were killed but 250 escaped injury when a rocket hit a hospital in southern England today.

Widespread aerial activity yesterday included an attack on the Hermann Goering works south-west of Linz, Austria, and on railway and communication lines in northern Italy and Yugoslavia.

During the varied operations, the communiqué said, 65 German aircraft were destroyed while 26 allied planes were reported missing.

Reconnaissance photographs showed that the tank works of the Goering plant, turning out heavy tanks and armored cars, "was virtually destroyed" by the bombardment from upwards of 500 fighter escorted Liberators, headquarters announced.

Yanks Invade Pisa.
The British eighth army advanced along a 30-mile front in northern Italy, striking within eight miles of the edge of Florence. On the west coast some units of the American Fifth army were within a few hundred yards of Pisa's leaning tower. German big guns battered the southern portion of the ancient city.

The Nazi big four of Hitler, Goering, Goebbels and Himmler sought to whip the German home front into line for a fight to the death. Hitler was reported preparing an order mobilizing "all Europeans in occupied countries without age or sex limitations." Goering became dictator over all public and private life in Germany.

In official communiqué reports on the twin Marianas op-

erations, Adm. Nimitz said that 2,400 Japanese have been killed on Guam through July 24—fifth day of that invasion—at a cost of 443 American dead, 2,366 wounded and 209 missing.

On Tinian through July 24—second day of that invasion—1,324 Japanese dead have been counted against American casualties of 15 dead and 225 wounded.

In the southwest Pacific, Gen. MacArthur reported that a trapped Japanese army, bloodily beaten back in more than a week of attempts to break out west of Wewak, British New Guinea, appeared to be "trying to reform his shattered units" five miles inland on the Driniumor river.

nese. It is strategic because the group lies some 800 miles southwest of Guam, which U. S. forces are now seizing; 800 miles northwest of Hollandia, big allied base on New Guinea, and an equal distance from Dutch East Indies islands below the Philippines.

The attacks tended to neutralize any Japanese attempts to interfere with Adm. Nimitz' invasions of Saipan, Guam and Tinian.

the Subwarki triangle (which east Prussia annexed in the Russian-German partition of Poland in 1939) and within 25 miles of the pre-war boundary of that province of the Prussian Junkers. (German reports have placed the Russians within eight miles of east Prussia proper.)

Bialystok was invested. Russians were in its outskirts with 4,500 yards of the major rail center controlling some traffic to east Prussia and Warsaw.

Nazis In Confusion
The 25th German general since June 23 surrendered in the Lwow area.

Reports from central Poland told of frantic German attempts to reorganize their shattered armies. Enemy infantry divisions were declared to have lost up to 40 per cent of their strength and German wounded were reported ordered "to fight to the last man."

Decisions appeared near in the red army's mighty drives to achieve four great objectives: slash the Baltic front in half; liberate all Poland; bring the war to the soil of east Prussia and Prussia itself; and open the mountain gateways to the Danube basin.
