

Sutherland, Olympia Supply Nines Win Softball Battles

Two extra innings were required last night to settle the softball dispute between the Sutherland Caribous and Roseburg Lumber company. Sutherland staged a four-run spurge in the sixth inning to overcome a 4 to 1 lead previously held by the Lumber company, but the Lumbermen came back in the last of the seventh to tie the score. Sutherland won the game in the first of the ninth inning.

A hit and an error gave the Lumbermen a run in the second inning, Sutherland tying the score with a tally in the third, when Roberts blasted out a three-base hit and scored on a fly ball to the outfield.

The Lumbermen pounded out five hits in the fourth inning to take a 4 to 1 lead, but in the sixth frame, a walk, two hits and a heartbreaking error at the plate, when Rutherford dropped the ball on a force play, permitting two runs to score, put Sutherland out in front by one run.

The Lumbermen tied the score when Storde's fly ball was dropped in the outfield and he went for three bases, scoring on a three-base hit by Solomon.

On the first of the ninth Sutherland won the game when Rice drew a walk and scored on a two-base hit by Patterson.

Olympic supply took the first game, 7 to 2, from Youngs Bay, being aided by five Youngs Bay errors.

Next he preached in Wesley's chapel, London, and then came the trip to Iceland. On Monday, May 3rd, there was a plane crash and Bishop Leonard made the final landing. But he was in the line of duty and finished his course with joy. In a far-away land, Iceland, he sleeps the quiet sleep of death. The Seattle Rainiers snapped their five-game losing streak last night with a 4 to 3 victory over the Portland Beavers in a 12-inning contest that had been scheduled as the 7-inning opener of a double-header.

Then the Rainiers went on to

shut out Beavers, 5 to 0, in the nightcap and gain a fourth place tie in the standings with the Hollywood Stars.

Never more than one run was scored by either team in an inning in the drawn-out first game and Seattle came from behind to tie the score in the third, seventh and ninth innings before they finally scored the winning run on a pair of singles in the 12th.
