

Drawings for Doe Deer, Cow Elk Tags Wait Applications

Hunters wishing to take part in any drawings for special cow elk and doe deer tags must have their applications on file at the Portland office of the state game commission not later than August 1. If at the end of that day's business, more applications are on hand than the number of tags to be issued, drawings will be held. In making application for these tags, a person should specify the type of tag desired and give his hunting license number if license has been purchased. No fee is to be remitted with applications.

There will be issued 6,000 doe deer tags for the open season October 1 to October 31 in the following area in Grant and Baker counties:

Beginning at Mt. Vernon; thence east along Highway No. 28 to the Unity reservoir; thence north along forest road through Whitney and Sumpter to Granite; thence north and west through Trout meadows to the Forks Guard station; thence west along Big Meadows creek and the North Fork of the John Day river to Dale; thence south along Highway No. 395 to Mt. Vernon, the point of beginning.

For the Wenaha area in northeastern Oregon, 500 tags have been authorized for the taking of antlerless elk during the open season from November 1 to November 30. The open area is as follows:

Beginning at the Oregon-Washington line north of Milton, south on Highway No. 11 to Pendleton; thence south along Highway No. 30 to LaGrande; thence north along Highway No. 82 to Elgin; north from Elgin along the Grande Ronde river to the Washington state line and west along state line to the point of beginning.

For a specified portion of the Hart mountain national antelope refuge there will be an open deer season from October 7 to 15, inclusive. The number of tags is limited to 300 doe deer and 200 buck deer.

Application for an antelope tag should be accompanied with the fee of \$2.50 for residents and \$5 for non-residents, together with information as to hunting license number. No drawing will be held for these tags although the maximum number of tags to be issued is limited to 2,500.

Spraying to Kill Filbert Moth Urged

Spray before July 22 for the control of filbert moth is advised by B. G. Thompson, associate entomologist, Oregon State college experiment station. Lead arsenate, used at the rate of 3 pounds to 100 gallons of water plus spreader, is the recommended spray.

Filbert moths were found emerging July 14 and sprays, to be effective must be applied before the eggs deposited on the foliage begin to hatch which is from 8 to 9 days after moths begin to fly.

Conditions in Douglas county are almost identical with those in the Willamette valley for the control of the filbert moth, states County Agent, J. Roland Parker. Correct timing of the control spray and thoroughness of application are essentials which cannot be over-emphasized for satisfactory results. Thorough coverage of foliage is best accomplished by spraying from the center of the tree outward, as well as from outside inward. Upper branches and tops of the trees should be well covered with spray as investigations indicate more eggs are laid in the upper parts of the tree than are deposited on the lower branches.

Growers who are equipped to dust should use a 40 per cent lead arsenate at a rate of about 40 pounds per acre. Dusting should be done in the early morning when atmospheric conditions are calm.

Other Regions Periled

By capturing Delatyn in the Carpathian foothills 20 miles from the Czech border, the Red army poses a threat to both Romania and Hungary, uneasy German puppet states.

At the top of the 1,000-mile undulating front, the capture of the bastion of Narva, (third city of Estonia) and an advance beyond, carried Soviet lines within 100 miles of Tallinn. The fall of Narva opened the way for a swift advance along the Gulf of Finland.

The Russians captured their 26th German general.

Baltic front troops were within 100 miles of the German cities of Memel and Tilsit, the latter a target of Russian bombs during the night. Riga, on the Latvia shore, was 65 miles north of the advancing Red army. The Suwalki triangle (of East Prussia through 1939 annexation) was three miles away and the pre-war East Prussian border within 25 miles.

Lumber Program Fixed

WFA has approved a program covering distribution of farm lumber which will become effective August 1. Farmers needing lumber for essential purposes will apply to local Triple-A committees for purchase certificates bearing preference ratings of AA-2 and AA-3. Dealers can also use these ratings to replenish their stocks. Because the new program imposes tighter controls of lumber uses and distribution, the new ratings will provide more assurance of stock replacement to all dealers than did the former AA-2X rating. Lumber allocated to agriculture for the July-September quarter is 11 per cent of expected production for that period, but only about half the amount normally used before the war. Future allotments are expected to be lower due to short supplies.

Americans Enlarge Thrust in Normandy

claimed 20 of yesterday's victims. French parachute troops are fighting behind German lines in Normandy and seven French aerial squadrons are participating in the invasion, Air Minister Grenier of the French committee of national liberation said today.

French patriots have defeated German tank attacks in ambushes

and are continuing successful warfare against the foe, the supreme command said today.

Patriot forces annihilated a German convoy of 116 trucks in one department, the bulletin declared.

Locks on important canals, particularly in the north and east, have been destroyed, interfering with transport of fuel, and "barges carrying 100,000 gallons of oil and fuel have been blown up and petrol depots and convoys have been destroyed, the bulletin added.

Battle in Pisa Looms

In Italy American troops occupied the entire section of Pisa south of the Arno river but the Germans were reported harrying streets in the north section for a house-to-house defense. The Germans launched heavy tank-supported counterattacks in an effort to halt the British eighth army's drive that has reached within eight miles of Florence on a ten-mile front.

Allied warships, transports and landing craft were reported by the Berlin radio tonight to be concentrated with several divisions of troops in the coastal area of the Tyrrhenian sea for an imminent new landing in northern Italy around LaSpezia and Genoa.

Further west in the Dutch New Guinea sector, Japs were caught attempting to flee from the invaded Schouten islands to Manokwari and a barge loaded with 50 soldiers was sunk by PT boats and bombers.
