## Recipe For Home Ice Cream Given

Wartime ice cream may not be as rich or smooth as it was in pre-war days, but it can be very refreshing. Keeping the ice crystals small is the secret of smoothness, says Mary V. Maw, emergency assistant. This is done by thoroughly beating the partly frozen cream and by using stabilizers such as gelatin and eggs. The very top of the bottle of milk is thick enough to whip if allowed to stand in the refrigerator a day or two. Take 1 and 1-4 cups of milk, mix it with 1-2 cup of sugar and 1-4 teaspoon of salt, and heat. Add two egg yolks and cook slowly over hot water until thickened. Dissolve 1 teaspoon of gelatin, which has been soaked a few minutes in 2 tablespoons of milk or water by holding it over hot water. Stir this into the milk mixture and cool. Add 1 teaspoon of vanilla. Whip the egg whites and mix with the cool custard. Set refrigerator to coldest temperature, pour mixture into tray and freeze to a slush. If it becomes too hard, break it up anyway, pour the partly frozen mixture into a bowl and beat quickly until smooth but not melted. Before removing the tray of ice cream, whip one cup of thick cream mentioned before and quickly fold into the partly frozen custard mixture. Return to the freezing tray and freeze but do not freeze too hard. Try to keep the ice cream at a slightly soft creamy texture rather than an extremely hard chippy texture. Serve plain or with crushed fruit.

The body has been removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors. Arrangements for funeral services have not been completed.
