## Roseburg Couple Marry in Eugene

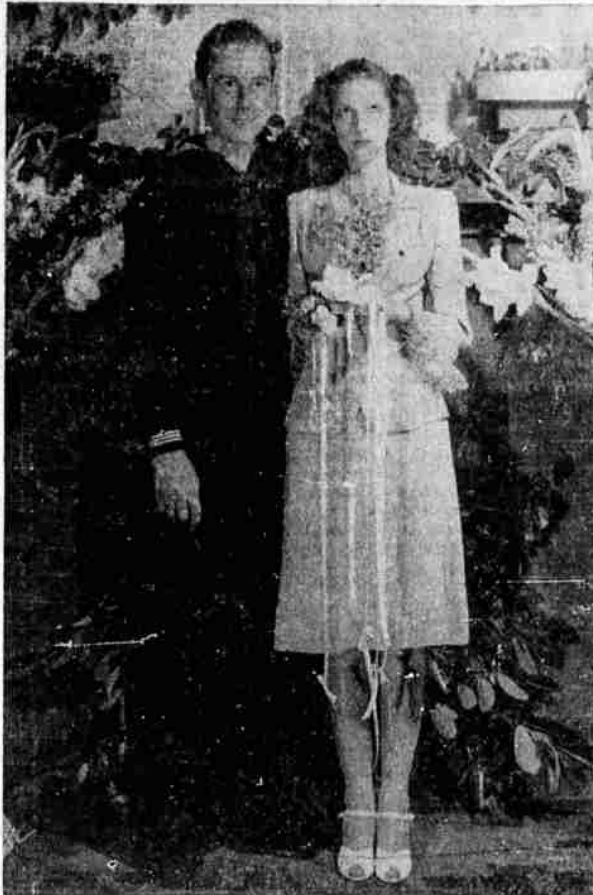

## Celebrate 60th Wedding Anniversary

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Niehus, pioneer residents of Springview, Nebr., and parents of Mrs. Albert Micelli, of Roseburg, celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary July 9 at a reception at their home from two to six in the afternoon. The affair was attended by more than 200 guests and included their family: Mrs. Micelli and daughter, Eleanor, and son, Bob, of Roseburg; Mrs. H. F. Slaughter, William F. Niehus, Valentine; John Niehus, Springview, and Jean Eileen Slaughter, a granddaughter, Valentine, Nebr. A grandson, William Barrett Niehus, of Valentine, was unable to be present.

Mr. and Mrs. Niehus are well known in Roseburg, having visited at the Micelli home upon numerous occasions. Members of the family assisted with the reception, at which time a beautiful decorated wedding cake was cut. Mrs. Niehus wore an attractive peach-colored crepe dress and a corsage of pink carnations and white irys. Music and visiting were enjoyed in the afternoon and numerous photographs were taken of the guests and family.

The occasion marked the eighteenth birthday of the Niehus' granddaughter, Eleanor Micelli. The Niehus' have lived in Keya Paha county, Nebr., for sixty years and are prominently known throughout the community. They came to the county in 1884 in a covered wagon soon after their marriage in Grand Island and lived through terror from Indian scares, saw destruction to crops from droughts and greshoppers; experienced low farm prices in depression years and witnessed

many more disadvantages one had to encounter in pioneer ranch life. Mr. Niehus was born at Holstein, Germany in 1860 and has made thirteen trips to his home country; taking his family with him in 1902 and making his last trip in September, 1939, about the time the war was started in Europe. He received his schooling in Germany before coming to America at the age of 15 to make his home at Grand Island, Nebr., with an older brother. He went prospecting for gold to the Black Hills and worked two years in Wyoming, before locating in 1884 in Keya Paha county. Until a few years ago, he had 10,000 acres of ranch land and hundreds of head of cattle and livestock. He now operates about 8000 acres of land. Besides his extensive ranching, he has operated side-line establishments such as a lumber yard and livery stable at Dallas and Bassett, and engaged in implement and real estate business. He is now 84 years of age and, although he suffered a severe illness this last winter, is still able to enjoy his work and he keeps up to date on numerous subjects. A weekly letter to each of his children is a customary habit he has exercised over a period of many years. Known as one of the largest land owners in the county, he is recognized as the oldest patron of the Packers National bank at Omaha.

Mrs. Niehus has a few chickens and raises a flower and vegetable garden. Both Mr. and Mrs. Niehus have many friends and their home has been the scene of numerous gatherings, large and small, during their sixty years of residing in the county.
