Dewey Puts Govt. Policy On Four-Year Basis

ALBANY, N. Y., July 27—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's plans for refurbishing the federal government—if the electorate gives him the nod in November—were put strictly on a four-year basis today, with the republican nominee calling for an end of what he classed as new deal "warfare" on states' rights.

Listing a series of topics for study by a G. O. P. governors' conference at St. Louis next week at a press conference yesterday, Dewey said he hoped the republicans could fix "an area of responsibility to the people," as between federal and local governments, that would settle the problem "not permanently, but for our time, or rather, the next four years."

He stressed the four-year basis of his program at a meeting attended also by Gov. John W. Bricker of Ohio, the vice presidential nominee.

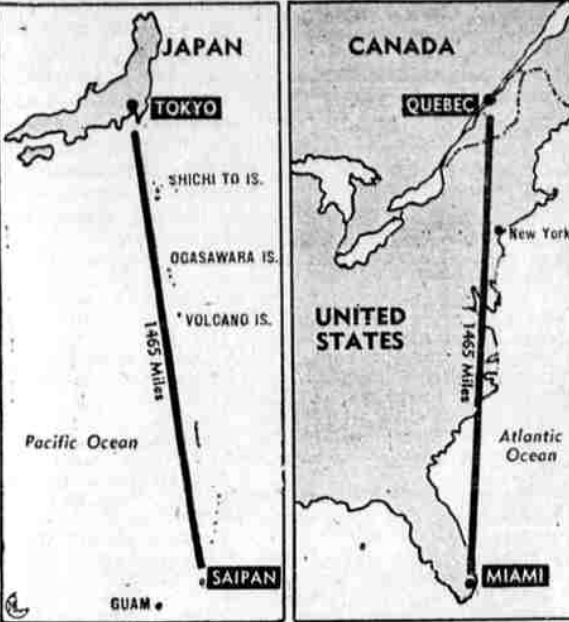

Saipan-Tokyo Bomber Run—Over Here



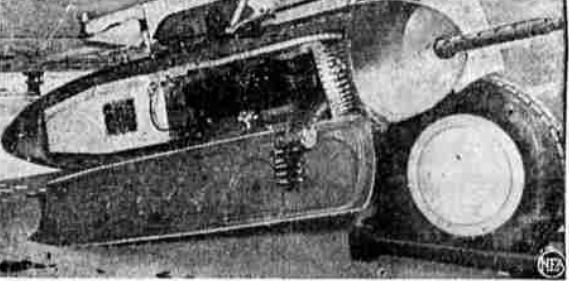
Saipan Island and Tokyo are approximately the same distance apart as Miami and Quebec—a not-too-tough run for our big land-based bombers.

Navy's 'Package' of Woe for Foe



Here is the first picture of the Navy's new "package machine gun," with torpedo-shaped containers opened to show mechanism. Hung under each wing of plane like bombs, a pair of these "packages" contains four machine guns and ammunition, and doubles the firepower of planes mounting four fixed-position guns. Emergency jettisoning of package by usual bomb-release lightens plane's load by 600 pounds.

Lt. Comdr. Johnson's Family to Reside Here

Commander Johnson, who is on leave of absence as Douglas county public health officer, has been stationed at Seattle since the outbreak of war as district venereal disease control officer, but he has been assigned to duty with the 4th Fleet and will be leaving in the near future for a station in the South Pacific.

REAL ESTATE PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in my judgment, a menace to life and property due to an excessive amount of inflammable debris left on the ground by logging operations, windstorms, and fires in past years, and
WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester, it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following area designated as:
Area No. 13-P—Western Lane Forest Protective Association Area: Township 19 South, Range 8 West: All of Township except that portion lying between the county road and the Siuslaw river. Township 20 South, Range 7 West: Secs. 1 to 24, inc., and 29 to 32, inc. Township 20 South, Range 8 West: All of Township. Township 21 South, Range 6 West: Secs. 5 to 11, inc., and 14 to 18, inc. Township 21 South, Range 7 West: Secs. 1 to 18, inc., except Sec. 12. Township 21 South, Range 8 West: Secs. 1 to 18, inc.

Permits for entering the above area may be obtained at the following places:
Western Lane F. P. A. Headquarters, Veneta.
Wolf Creek Station, Sec. 36, T. 18 S., R. 8 W.
C. V. Oglesby, Sec. 18, T. 18 S., R. 8 W.
Yellow Point L. O., Sec. 16, T. 20 S., R. 7 W.

NOW, THEREFORE, I EARL SNEEL, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 107-209, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, amended by Chapter 238, Oregon Laws 1941, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above described area to be unlawful and that said area shall be subject to entry only through permit to be issued by the State Forester, or a fire warden, under which permit entrant shall comply with any and all of the following requirements:
(a) To build no fires except in places designated as safe in said permit.
(b) To have as a part of his or her equipment tools suitable for extinguishing fire.
(c) To refrain from smoking except in places designated as safe in said permit.

This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 24th day of July, 1944, and shall remain in full force and effect until the 31st day of December, 1944. Done at the Capitol in Salem, Oregon, this 21st day of July, 1944.

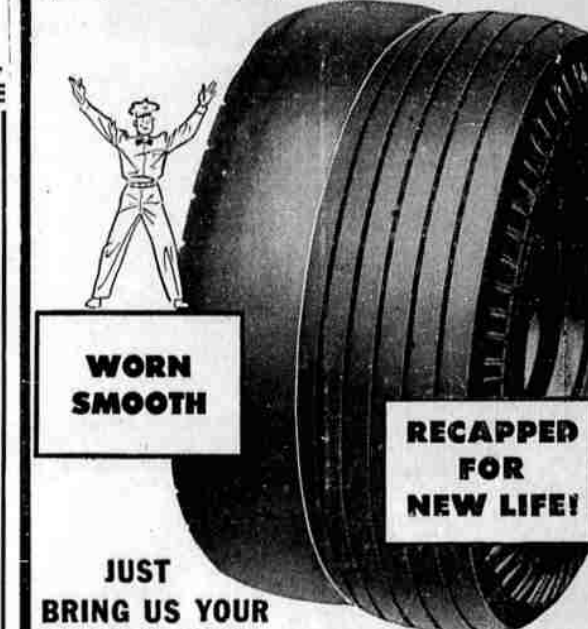
