Warsaw, Ancient Doormat of Wars, Prize of Various Conquerors, Has Had Brief Periods of Independence

Warsaw—Ancient crossroads of conquerors—once again is in the path of invading armies. It has been a vortex of military conflict for centuries but always has risen from the rubble. Now there is but little left of the city to destroy. The nazis saw to that. Yet Warsaw is the new focal point of the war in eastern Europe.

The last battle of Warsaw started with a 27-day siege when the nazi legions crossed the frontier on Sept. 1, 1939. One of the first things the Luftwaffe did was to bomb the capital and by Sept. 6 the Polish government evacuated the city.

The garrison stood. The Warsaw radio appealed to citizens to dig in. By Sept. 9 heavy artillery was shelling and German planes continued to bomb the city. On Sept. 13 it was virtually encircled. On Sept. 16 the Germans sent an ultimatum, but the city refused to surrender. On Sept. 27 it finally capitulated.

During the siege the German air force and heavy artillery killed an estimated 60,000 civilians and wounded 100,000. Of 20,650 buildings in Warsaw half were wholly or partly destroyed.

Twice Taken by Swedes
The first to invade the city, after it became the Polish capital in 1590, was King Charles Gustavus of Sweden who captured it in 1665 and kept it for a year, when the Poles recaptured it.

The city suffered damage when King Charles XII of Sweden took it in 1702; the following year, peace made it a free city again. The Russians first seized it in 1764; lost it in the first partition of Poland in 1773; retook it in 1794 after a bloody assault. In another partition in 1795 Warsaw was given to Prussia.

Early Independence Brief
Napoleon occupied it in 1806; the following year it was made an independent duchy. Then the Austrians took possession of Warsaw in 1809, from April to June.

Army style beef is now defined as "dressed steer carcasses weighing 400 to 1,100 pounds and dressed half carcasses weighing between 350 and 600 pounds, grading U. S. Choice, good, Commercial and Utility." Beef meeting this description is subject to the set-aside requirements which WFA has amended to provide that the armed forces will obtain the same percentage (35 per cent) of "Choice" and "Good" grades of army style beef as is obtained of "Commercial" and "Utility" grades.

Restaurants Get Order to Display Prices of Food

Roseburg restaurant patrons will soon be able to see and check the ceiling prices of the meals and food items they buy, Mr. L. V. Hammock chairman of the War Price and Rationing board, said today.

In cooperation with the national Restaurant Industry Advisory council, OPA has issued a restaurant ceiling price regulation which became effective on July 31, requiring every public eating and drinking establishment to post prominently the prices of 40 basic food items. The items will be selected by the OPA and the District Restaurant Advisory council and posters for displaying the prices will be provided by the War Price and Rationing board. Each proprietor must list the 40 items selected in clearly legible lettering.

Posters must be displayed by August 16, 1944, Mr. Hammock said, and three copies of the prices listed on the poster must be filed with the board by August 23.

Establishments which do not serve all of the 40 selected items must post the prices of those they do sell and add other commonly sold items until the poster is filled, Mr. Hammock explained.

Fire Prevention Pointers Offered Oregon Farmers

Care in advance on the part of farmers to have simple fire-fighting equipment readily available will go a long way to prevent even the usual losses from grain and grass fires in Oregon this summer, according to Dan D. Robinson, project forester of the Oregon state board of forestry, in a discussion of this subject over radio station KOAC recently.

any farmer are a supply of water, gunny sacks, shovels, flaps, and pump cans ready for immediate use, says Robinson. Some of these can be kept on the tractor and combine at all times.

A well placed plow is also one of the most important pieces of fire-fighting equipment. After fire guards are plowed around grain fields and farm buildings, the plow is best placed on the upwind side of the harvest field with the lever set at the most effective depth for plowing fire lines. Robinson suggests. The coupling and pin are left in place for immediate use.

If a fire starts and gets beyond the size where it can be handled immediately with water, shovels, and sacks, the plow is put into action. Robinson says experience

has shown that the best way is to begin plowing a line parallel to the direction the fire is traveling, starting on the downwind flank of the fire, gradually working toward the head of the blaze. It is always best to turn the furrow toward the fire. A ground crew following with hand tools is essential.

The inexperienced fire fighter is likely to turn in front of the blaze too soon and may be forced

to abandon his equipment or turn out to get away from danger. Robinson suggests plowing to a point rather than straight across in front of the fire.

Art King, extension specialist in charge of rural fire organization, reports that crews are again organized in practically all communities to help control serious outbreaks. Forest fire wardens are on call throughout the state to assist when requested.
