Funds Allotted Tenants As Loans to Buy Farms

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2—(AP)—The War Food administration today announced the allocation of \$15,000,000 among the states and territories for loans to tenants for the purchase of farms. Texas led with \$1,282,835, with Mississippi a close second with \$1,128,747.

The loans will be made ready by the Farm Security administration under terms of the Jones-Bankhead farm tenant act.

The WFA said the \$15,000,000 fund should be sufficient to help tenant families get started on the road to farm ownership.

Allocation of funds and estimated loans, by states, included: Oregon, \$57,314.

Funds allocated Nevada and Alaska were insufficient to buy one farm. Such funds will be held over until next year.

Cities Plan Mass Hysteria Ban On War Victory Day

SEATTLE, Aug. 2—(AP)—Seattle police were alerted today in preparation for averting mass hysteria when the announcement of allied victory in Europe is made.

In a bulletin issued to all divisional and precinct commanders and auxiliary police, Chief of Police Herbert D. Kimsey outlined plans for cancellations of leaves, furlough and vacations and orders for all police and auxiliary officers to report for duty when V-day occurs.

Primary among the instructions, however, was a warning to "avoid rumors. No one knows when V-day will be."

The retail trade bureau, Kimsey said, has adopted V-day schedules calling for immediate evacuation of customers and employees and closing of stores if V-day is announced during operation hours.

Should the announcement come at night, after store hours, the business houses will be closed the following day.

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 2—(AP)—Kansas City's merchants won't be unprepared for the pandemonium on V-day—the day Germany gives up the fight.

The Merchants association has decreed that all downtown stores must close within minutes after the first word is received, the employees are to put cash, records and valuable merchandise in protected places—and then go out and join in the fun.

Some merchants already have built sectional board walls which can be erected in a few moments to protect their plate glass windows against pressure of celebrating throngs.

Movies and taverns are planning similar action.

Other cities throughout the country are expected to adopt the scheme, the association reported.

Farm News Briefs

E-2 and R-2 non-highway gasoline coupons are now being issued to farmers and other non-highway users and will be valid concurrently with the E-1 and R-1 coupons now in circulation, OPA has announced.

With civilian consumption running an estimated 20 per cent over the July allocation of 100,000,000 pounds, OPA put ration point values for butter back at 16 points per pound. Butter production for the first 7 months of this year is 10.5 per cent below last year's production for the same period.

Production of commercial truck crops this summer will be about 13 per cent greater than last year and about 9 per cent above the 10-year average.

Uniform ceiling prices have been set at all levels of distribution for all weights of turkeys and special price increases are allowed from July through October to encourage early marketing of birds needed by the army.
