In the Day's News: (Continued from page 1) planes to do VISUAL bombing. THERE are interesting reports of French guerrillas operating in important strength behind the German lines, breaking up communications, etc.

ON the eastern front, Warsaw is reported in flames as the Russians advance on its suburbs behind a deluge of shells and bombs. The reds are said to be firing heavy guns over open sights at the city's defenses.

THE Balkan rumor factory is going full blast. Von Papen (German ambassador to Turkey) is said to have threatened the Turks with war if they move farther toward our side.

KEEP this point clearly in mind: If the Germans were still as invincible as they claim to be, these well-informed neutrals and satellites wouldn't be so jittery.

DON'T get a false picture of the news. The going isn't easy. Breaking out of the Normandy peninsula is no picnic. The fighting is bloody and terrible.

MAC ARTHUR'S forces land on Sunday at Sansapor, on the northwest tip of New Guinea. To get there, they jumped 200 miles from Noemfoor Island, in the Schoutens.

A spokesman for our side calls this the last operation of the New Guinea campaign. "We now control the whole northern New Guinea coast," he adds.

FREEDOM FOR QUEZON

DEATH has terminated the hope of that zealous patriot, Manuel Quezon, to preside over a free and independent Philippine government. He once fought against the United States as a lieutenant of the insurrectionist Aguinaldo, but lived to see this nation become the champion of his native land.

Although he fought in the insurrection, his battles were not primarily against the United States but were rather against any forces which would curtail the freedom of the Philippines. He never rested from that fight.

Born August 18, 1878, of mixed Filipino and Spanish parentage, he was a student of law in 1898 when the Spaniards were driven out of possession of the islands. After the insurrection, he was held in military prison for six months.

He became one of the two resident commissioners for the islands in Washington in 1909. He was elected president of the first insular senate in 1916, and when the Philippines were established as a commonwealth by congressional act, signed in March, 1934, he became the first president, taking office in 1935, with the definite pledge of full independence in 1945.

One of President Quezon's first official acts was to entrust to General Douglas MacArthur the establishment of military defenses. The brilliance with which that task was performed is one of the brightest pages of the history of the current war, yet one of the blackest blots upon the record of the United States.

But MacArthur has not surrendered his assignment. President Quezon must have died happy in the thought that in his choice of a military leader he had been guided to select one who would remain true to his trust.

Tarawa, Saipan, Guam, New Guinea, Tinian, and Sansapor, have been great victories, establishing firmly the reputation for American feats of arms. But they are more than that. They are stepping stones to the Philippines.

Thousands of men have died because we failed to listen to the pleas of Manuel Quezon and General MacArthur that we provide suitable defenses for the commonwealth in the Pacific. We have paid heavily for our failure to fortify Guam. But we are winning back the territory lost through our past failures and soon will be in a position to redeem the land Quezon loved so dearly.

Quezon was promised Philippine independence in 1945. There is every indication that pledge will be fulfilled. The blood of American soldiers will mark the path. The cost in lives will exceed that required to win our own independence from Great Britain. But we have every assurance to believe the promise made in 1935 will be executed on time and the wasted mortal remains of the brave little Filipino president will finally rest in the soil of a free land.

Spain's Minister Of Foreign Affairs Dies

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, Aug. 3 (AP)—Gen. Francisco Sousa, 68, Spain's minister of foreign affairs, died here today of a heart attack.

It was largely through Sousa that negotiations were carried out by the allies which resulted last spring in Spain's agreeing to cut tungsten ore shipments to Germany, to expel axis agents from Spain, Spanish Morocco and Tangier, to close the German consulate and other axis agencies in Tangier, and to release interned

State Tax Levy Month Not Mandatory, Ruling

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 3—(AP)—The law providing that the state tax levy in July of each year is directory rather than mandatory, Attorney General Neuner ruled today.

The commission was unable to make its annual levy in July because of the failure of one county assessor to file his report. The levy, which will be the basis for determining how much of an income tax reduction shall be made next year, will be announced in a few days.

The tax commission reduced income taxes by 75 per cent on taxes payable this year, but the reduction on taxes payable next year will be considerably less.
