Cordon Gives Edition To Oregon Library

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 3.—(AP)—The new 37-volume edition of the writings of George Washington has been presented to the state library by U. S. Sen. Guy Cordon, Librarian Eleanor Stephens announced today.

She said the edition is complete except that it omits Washington's diary, which is available in several other sources.

Cordon Joins In Protest Against Lamb Rationing

Making further protest against continuation of lamb on the ration list, U. S. Senator Guy Cordon reported today he has wired the Office of Price Information and Office of War Food Production at Washington, D. C., detailing results of a survey made of conditions in Oregon and Washington state.

The OPA had objected to removal of points on lamb because of the danger of possible imports from Montana and other producing areas, creating scarcity in some sections of the country, Cordon said. The senator reported to the OPA that the surplus in the two states is more than equal to the demand. Montana lambs, he said, normally move to eastern markets and will continue to do so, even if rationing is lifted in Oregon and Washington, because of greater freight rates.

With the market glutted with mutton and lamb, the senator stated, producers are being forced to sell high quality lambs at a scale for cull lambs in order to avoid total loss.

There is no local manpower shortage in connection with preparing lamb or mutton for market, he stated, as the products can be handled through regular procedure without increase in manpower and without prejudice to other meats.

He also informed the OPA, which had suggested that lifting of ration points might affect army requirements, that there is no record of the army ever increasing its buying to relieve local surpluses, that the army and navy already had secured supplies and that removal of ration points would not affect war necessity.

Robert E. McKean, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. McKean, Roseburg, has been promoted to first lieutenant, according to word received from the 15th army air force in Italy. He is a pilot of a P-30 Lightning fighter and a member of the top scoring fighter group in the Mediterranean area. He has been awarded the air medal with two oak leaf clusters for achievements against the enemy while flying over southern Europe. His wife resides at Yakima, Wash.
