

Another Jap Airfield On Guam Taken

(By the Associated Press.)
Americans tightening the noose on some 10,000 Japanese pressed into the northern third of Guam have seized another airfield, bringing to seven the nest of Marianas dromes from which U. S. aerial might may soon strike into Japan's vitals from the Pacific.

Army and marine troops, killing seven enemy soldiers for every one they lost, pushed tirelessly forward against rising resistance. But the end of the enemy seemed as sure as on conquered Tinian, where all but a handful of Japanese, hiding in caves, were accounted for.

Tinian's Japanese civilians streamed willingly out of caves to surrender.

Adm. Nimitz announced his forces had killed about 33,000 of the enemy on Guam, Tinian and Saipan, against a loss of 3,589 American dead, 17,548 wounded and 1,550 missing.

Gen MacArthur's forces on New Guinea far to the south turned back two more frenzied Japanese attempts to break free of the allied trap near Aitape. Enemy losses were heavy.

The big Japanese offensive in China rose in fury over a wide area, but Hengyang still held out. The Chinese, besieged for five weeks, threw back ten enemy attempts to crack into the inner parts of the city. To the north-east, Chungking reported, the enemy made sharp gains, strengthening its eastern anchor of the drive down both sides of the Hankow-Canton railway, the prize at stake.

Bad Check Counts Hold 2 Men Here

Robert Lee Mallette, 30, North Bend electrician, was in the county jail at Roseburg today in lieu of \$1,500 bail, following appearance in the justice court at Reedsport, where Judge Fred M. Wright ordered him held to the grand jury on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. Mallette is alleged, according to Deputy Sheriff R. G. Baker, to have cashed worthless checks in Portland, Eugene, Roseburg, Reedsport and elsewhere.

Also in jail on bad check charges was Cecil Brooks Swain, 36, Sacramento, who was arrested today by state police upon information furnished from Sacramento. He was taken into custody while travelling along the highway near Roseburg and is being held for California authorities.

Justice Levies Fines
In the Roseburg Justice court, Judge Thomas C. Hartfield reported a fine of \$50 paid by Leroy V. St. Arnold, following a plea of guilty to a charge of furnishing liquor to a minor. A 30-day jail sentence was suspended.

Traffic fines paid included Roy V. Strong, \$10, failure to stop at a through highway, and Jacob G. Truax, \$10 overloaded truck. Arrest in Portland of Charles Heppner, wanted in Douglas county on a charge of larceny by

bailee, was reported by Sergeant Paul Morgan of the state police. Heppner is alleged, the officer stated, to have "borrowed" a trailer belonging to Ray Anderson and to have retained possession of the equipment.

This Delicious Recipe Saves Sugar and Berries.

3 1/4 Cups Juice
1/2 Cup Sugar
1/2 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash 3 quarts of fully ripe berries. Crush thoroughly and squeeze out the juice. Measure exactly 3 1/4 cups of the juice (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well, bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 2 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, skim. Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.
