## Interesting, Newly-Received Books On Current Topics, Fiction Offered Patrons of Roseburg Public Library

Among new books recently received at the Roseburg Public library are two of outstanding interest to readers of history and particularly timely and appropriate in their relation to the current cataclysm of war.

One, entitled "America," was written by Stephen Vincent Benet at the request of the Office of War Information, and was designed for translation into a number of languages. The book, finished before Benet's death in 1943, is not a chronology of national events but the spiritual asay of a people. It is comprised of only 122 pages, yet it is astonishing how much of the American legend it expresses. Freedom, which first was largely based on space to move about in, becomes in our time, as Benet emphasizes, freedom based on spiritual concept and world cooperation. The development of the American spirit, from the days of the first colonists to the war we are fighting today, is faithfully portrayed by the author.

The other book referred to is entitled "Ten Years in Japan," written by Joseph Clark Grew, former U. S. ambassador to the land of the Rising Sun. It is, as one reviewer puts it, the record of a man on the hot seat trying honestly to deal with dishonesty and failing tragically to do the impossible. The period covered by the narrative was the most dangerous years in the joint history of the U. S. and Japan, with the sword of Damocles constantly over Grew's head. He was certain the sword would fall, but unable to determine when and in which direction.

Haycox' Latest Available  
New fiction added to the library's shelves includes the latest work of a well-known Oregon author, Ernest Haycox, "Bugles in the Afternoon." It presents a strong character delineation of Gen. George A. Custer and a description of the famous massacre of Custer and his men by Indians at the battle of Little Big Horn. Frontier army post life and a romance are wolded into the story.

Another post fiction production offered library patrons is "Camal Town," authored by Samuel Hopkins Adams. It's about the digging of the Erie canal and also a young doctor with ideals who is too stubborn to bow before frontier superstitions and the Great God Mammon. He sticks by science even when science almost trips him up with a miracle.

### Fires on North Umpqua Below 5-Year Average

Ray B. Hampton reports that 45 fires have been listed in the North Umpqua district this season. The five-year average has been 55. Of the 45 fires, all have been lightning fires but one, and all except six have been under a quarter of an acre in extent. The exceptions have been approximately an acre in size. Mr. Hampton states that of these fires, 11 have been in the Bohemia district, nine in the North Umpqua district, seven in the So. Umpqua district, and 18 in the Diamond lake district.

### Lifting of Lamb Points Expected After Inquiry

MEDFORD, ORE., Aug. 5. (AP)—Sen. Guy Cordon (R-Ore.) said here today he was confident that an investigation by OPA would reveal the justice in a recommendation by its western head that point rationing be taken off lamb in Oregon and Washington.

"I cannot understand why the OPA will appoint district representatives and then refuse to take the recommendations of those representatives," Senator Cordon said. "I am confident that a most thorough investigation by OPA will disclose the conditions as they have been presented by both the local OPA and myself."

### Idaho Will Fight Cut in Freight Rates on Hogs

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 3.—(AP)—President J. D. Rigney of the Idaho public utilities commission said his agency will "fight to the finish an attempt by midwest packers to invade Idaho's market for hogs on the Pacific coast."

Midwest packers have asked the Interstate Commerce commission to reduce rail rates on fresh meats and packing products from

midwestern states to the Pacific coast, Rigney said, and an ICC trial examiner has recommended the reduction.

Rigney said such a cut, if approved by the ICC, "will materially reduce the price being paid hog producers in Idaho by west coast packers."

He asserted other western states would join in fighting the reduction.
