Mrs. M. J. McCarthy Dies in Roseburg

Mrs. Mary Jane McCarthy, 87, well-known resident of Roseburg, died at Mercy hospital yesterday, following a short illness. Mrs. McCarthy suffered a fall in her home last Friday, fracturing her hip. She was born at Roundstone, County Galway, Ireland, March 15, 1857, and came to the United States about 70 years ago, making her home first in Philadelphia, then San Francisco, from which city she came to Oregon, first making her home at Eugene, where she was married to James Patrick McCarthy in 1880. About a year later she came to Roseburg. Mr. McCarthy died several years ago. Mrs. McCarthy was a member of the Catholic church. Surviving is a daughter, Miss Della McCarthy, of Roseburg. Funeral services will be held at St. Joseph's Catholic church, where requiem mass will be celebrated at 9 o'clock Saturday morning. Interment will follow in the Catholic cemetery. Recitation of the Rosary will be held at the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home Friday evening at 7:00 o'clock.

Western Railways To Face Federal Suit, Biddle Says

SPOKANE, Aug. 10—(AP)—Declaring that the Sherman anti-trust act does apply to railroads and to freight rates "and the supreme court has so held," United States Atty Gen. Biddle told the Spokane Bar association yesterday the government was contemplating action against western railroads to halt "violations" of the act. "The investigation is now being ended of western railroads," he said. "The investigation has revealed that a commissioner who is not a representative of the government but is a sort of Will Hays of the railroad industry, says what the railroads may or may not do... and they bow to his order."

He said the development of Pacific coast states has been hampered by "discriminatory" freight rates, a statement challenged in Chicago by H. M. Sims, public relations director for the Western Association of Railway Executives, as a "smear" perpetrated "for political reasons." Sims said the commissioner agreement under which western railroads had been operating was discontinued several months ago.

Yankees Near Chartres, 45 Miles From Paris

ress port of St. Malo, taking 3,000 prisoners in this area. Elements of three German divisions were said to be trapped in Brest and the Germans were reported

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from England and Italy struck today at fuel and transport facilities around Paris and, for the second time in a dozen hours, at the great Romanian oil center of Ploesti. Upwards of 500 Flying Fortresses and Liberators, escorted by Mustangs and Lightnings, started fires licking at the refineries, tank cars and derricks 35 miles north of Bucharest. Some installations 19 miles northwest of Ploesti also were bombed in this 13th attack from Italy on the major spring of nazi oil. Several enemy fighters were destroyed after the armada broke through a screen of interceptors and tossed their explosives in a storm of intense flak. Allied naval forces were ready to pounce upon any attempted German evacuation from Brittany by sea. Already they had broken up three convoys apparently engaged in an effort to remove key personnel from St. Nazaire and St. Malo, and today's communiqué announced three more clashes in which torpedo boats and light coastal forces figured off the channel islands and near Le Havre.
