Young's Bay mill company won from Roseburg Lumber company 9 to 4, and Olympia Supply defeated Dunham's Transfer, 11 to 6, in softball games at Finlay field Wednesday night.

Davis, starting on the mound for Roseburg Lumber, ran into immediate difficulties, permitting three hits, which, coupled with three walks, allowed Young's Bay five runs, before Strobe took over the pitching chore. Roseburg Lumber played without the services of Blake, regular chucker, as well as three of the regular outfielders.

Young's Bay filled the bases in the fourth and fifth innings but scored only two runs in the fourth and one in the fifth, adding another in the sixth to complete their nine runs. They robbed Roseburg Lumber in the third when, with the bases loaded, Strobe hit a low liner to Jackson at second base, and Westbrook and Evans were doubled off bases for a fast triple play. Young, pitching for the Millmen, permitted only three hits outside the sixth inning, following a shift in catchers, he became unsteady and allowed three bingles and gave up two walks, accounting for four runs.

Ellison Halts Debut
Dunham's Transfer, also playing with a patchwork lineup, started off well, gathering three runs in the first inning when Peterson, Olympia Supply company pitcher, was unable to locate the plate and walked three batters. A hit and an error gave the Transfermen three runs. Olympia Supply, however, came back in their half of the frame and pounced on Ward for four hits and a walk, good for four runs.

Bud Ellison, Dunham's regular twirler, who returned from the field from the Elks national convention in Chicago, arrived at the ball field in time to halt a massacre in progress in the sixth inning. Ward, unaccustomed to pitching, began to tire and walked four batters. Two hits and a couple of errors added to the debacle, which was in full progress when Ellison arrived at the field as a spectator and was immediately impressed into service.

Ellison walked in a run while warming up, but retired the next two batters to make the three outs for the inning, ending the debacle with six runs.

Beavers Nose Out Seals in Battle Of Ten Innings

The Portland Beavers made it two in a row over the San Francisco Seals last night when they rallied in the late innings to take a 6 to 2 decision in the Seal park.

Held scoreless for seven innings after the Seals had posted a two-run lead in the first, the Portlanders gathered in a run in the eighth and then tied the score with another in the ninth. In the first extra inning the Beavers broke loose with a four-run, spurge that settled the game.

The Seattle Rainiers likewise won their second straight from Hollywood, 7 to 2, to even their series. Pitcher Demoran limited the Stars to four hits while his mates were garnering 11 from the offerings of three Hollywood hurlers.

League-leading Los Angeles avenged their defeat of the night before by blasting the Sacramento Solons, 12 to 6, in a game in which every man in the Los Angeles lineup collected at least one hit, for a total of 16 safe blows.

The tail-end San Diego Padres defeated the Oakland aces, 5 to 2, as Pitcher Cecil tightened in the pinches to chalk up his 19th victory of the season. It was Cecil's last game with the Padres before leaving to join the Boston Red Sox.

Printing Soldier Ballots Speeded

Speedy effort will be made to speed Douglas county election ballots to soldiers in ample time for the November election, County Clerk Roy Agee reports. Requests for service men's ballots are increasing in volume, Agee states, and more than 200 already are on file. A very large percentage of

the applications are from men in overseas theaters.

Ballots are to be placed in the hands of the printer early in September, Agee said, so that a sufficient number may be printed to supply overseas service men. These will be printed in advance but may have to be revised if any late nominations are received. They will be prepared for mailing, and will be posted as soon as the time for filing by independent candidates expires, Sept. 22.

The City of Roseburg is cooperating by requiring nominations for mayor, councilmen, recorder, and treasurer to be filed at the office of the county recorder by Sept. 11. A resolution closing the nominations on that date was adopted by the council and formal notice is being served by publication.

N. Hampshire for Dewey, He's Told

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 10 — (AP) — Governor Thomas E. Dewey, republican presidential nominee, was told today by Charles M. Dale, republican candidate for governor of New Hampshire, that he was certain to win that state's four electoral votes in November.

Dale conferred with Dewey at the executive mansion prior to the governor's conference with Gov. Walter E. Edge and a New Jersey congressional delegation. Dale, mayor of Portsmouth, told newsmen that he believed a strong national and state ticket in New Hampshire and "resentment against the New Deal" would carry that state for the republican presidential nominee for the first time since 1932.

"Our state is made up of small industries," Dale said. "They have a difficult time living under involved regulation. The large industries may devote part of their staffs to the job. The small industries are hiked."

Price Incentive Encourages Early Turkey Marketing

Oregon turkey growers will have a financial as well as a patriotic incentive to market as many of their turkeys as possible early this season while the government is buying enough to meet the needs of the armed forces in this country and overseas, according to information received by William A. Schoenfeld, dean and director of agriculture at Oregon State college.

By recent action of the OPA, an advance of one cent per pound has been allowed from now until the end of September for live turkeys, and two cents a pound for dressed turkeys. Advances of one-half cent and one cent respectively are allowed for October unless the government's quota is met before the end of that month.

"These advances in ceiling prices are strictly a wartime measure intended to hasten procurement of turkeys for the armed forces overseas and in this country," says Dean Schoenfeld. "The OPA has ruled that they will prevail only while the turkey procurement program is in effect, but in no event later than October 31. That makes it a case of the early bird again getting the best of the deal."

These new ceiling prices on live and dressed birds apply to both designated and non-designated areas under the turkey procurement program.

Expansion in the armed forces and extension of battle lines to more distant overseas areas mean that the need for hasty is greater than ever if all American men and women in uniform are to have their traditional holiday dinners this year, according to War Food administration officials.
