

Clothing Sought Here for Needy Folk of Holland

Anticipating the day of liberation for Holland, the Queen Wilhelmina Fund, Inc., an organization formed for the relief of the distressed people of the Netherlands, is appealing for donations of clothing, according to Mrs. M. F. Middelburg, representative of the organization at Roseburg.

During the last four years only the well-to-do people in Holland have been able to purchase an occasional suit of clothes, according to information received at the fund's headquarters. It is estimated that an enormous amount of clothing will be necessary to clothe the poorer people of the country immediately after liberation.

An estimated total of 500,000 slave workers will be returned from concentration camps, it is announced, and all will be in need of clothing.

Approximately 70,000 bundles of clothing for men, women and children have been collected in receiving stations throughout the United States, but the amount is only a small percentage of what will be required. Priorities for shipping and distribution have been promised.

It is requested that persons having used clothing, which is in fairly good condition and clean, donate it to the cause. Mrs. Middelburg has arranged a receiving station in Roseburg at Roy's Store for men until Sept. 1, and donated garments may be left there. Any persons desiring specific information are invited to contact Mrs. Middelburg, phone 16F13.

Ride to Camp is Offered Scouts

An opportunity for free transportation for from 10 to 15 Boy Scouts to Camp Lucky Boy has been afforded the Douglas county Boy Scout council, Bruce Elliott, chairman, announced today. An operator of a truck will be making a trip Sunday to the vicinity of the camp, located east of Eugene, and if 10 or more boys desire to avail themselves of free transportation, he will take them to the camp without charge, Elliott stated.

The committee does not have a record of Douglas county scouts who have registered for the camp and who have not yet attended, making it impossible to contact those who might desire to take advantage of the opportunity for transportation, Elliott said. It is requested, therefore, that all boys desiring to go to the camp Sunday leave their names at the office of the Roseburg chamber of commerce. In the event at least 10 desire to make the trip, provisions for travel will be made.

Origin of Weeds in U. S. Cited by Control Experts

Weed control specialists who have investigated the origin of some of America's worst perennial pests report that Canada thistle was introduced from Europe at Montreal, Canada, by Burgoyne's army; that bindweed or morning glory came from some unknown source in 1850; that Russian knapweed came in with imported alfalfa and sugar beet seed in 1900, and that white-top arrived from Europe and Asia in 1890 in alfalfa seed.

Fuel Dealers Required To File Ceiling Prices

Fuel dealers who have not filed ceiling prices with the OPA board, should do so immediately, it was announced today by the

Roseburg office. All dealers in wood and sawdust were placed under price ceilings in 1942. It was stated, but some dealers who have entered business since that date have failed to file their prices with the OPA. Regulations require, the office announced, that a listing of all fuel prices be furnished. New operators are to base their charges upon the prices maintained by their nearest competitors. Any changes in prices made by dealers since previous listings also should be furnished the board.

Women Students At OSC Increase At Heavy Rate

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—A marked increase in women students attending Oregon State college over the past 10 years is shown in statistics released by the registrar's office here.

Total enrollment of women credit students for the year 1943-44 was 1653, compared with 940 10 years ago and 1530 five years ago. This is an increase of 74 per cent in the 10-year period. Even a larger increase is shown in the number of women students entering for the first time. Number of new women students for the year just closed was 789 compared with 418 10 years ago and 684 five years ago, or an increase of 90 per cent for the 10-year period.

Present indications are for another increase in new women students this year, possibly amounting to 10 per cent, according to advance applications. Reservations have already been made for all of the rooms in Waldo and Snell halls, and in the smaller east and west halls.

Plenty of additional women's housing facilities will be available this year, however, through the use of as many of the men's fraternity houses again as will be needed, college officials announced. Seven cooperative houses will care for approximately 200 students, while the 13 sororities will also be operated to capacity. A new women's dormitory to help meet the needs after the men take back the fraternity houses is included in the postwar building program adopted recently by the state board of higher education.

FRESH PEACH JAM IS EASY TO MAKE

Here's a Recipe That Saves Sugar and Fruit

4 Cups Ground Peaches
6 Cups Sugar
1/2 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, peel, and remove pits from 4 pounds fully ripe peaches; grind the fruit. Measure exactly 4 level cups of the ground peaches (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary) in a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

Use of "F" Truck To Help Neighbor Approved by Law

The extent to which farmers owning trucks of "F" plate registry are authorized to do hauling for their neighbors is explained in the recent bulletin on farm transportation facts issued by the O. S. C. extension service as a leader's handbook. Paul Carpenter, author of the bulletin and leader of the extension ser-

vice farm transportation project, obtained legal opinions on this subject, which include the following essential facts:

(1) Any "F" plate truck owner, in addition to hauling his own produce and supplies to and from his farm, may infrequently and for a nominal consideration haul such crops and livestock produced and supplies consumed and used by other farmers in his immediate neighborhood.

This term "infrequently" is defined as meaning any number of trips not exceeding 20 in any one month and not exceeding 40 trips in any one year. The "immediate

neighborhood" is subject to a common-sense interpretation and varies widely in different parts of the state.

(2) For a nominal consideration but without limitation as to frequency he may haul to any market the agricultural commodities produced by neighbors and may deliver farm supplies to them, provided such neighbors are within a radius of five miles of the farmer furnishing the hauling service if the operation is west of the Cascade mountains, or within a radius of 10 miles if east of the mountains.

"Nominal consideration" is defined as any charge mutually

agreeable. To an increasing extent farmers hauling for other farmers are charging the published rates permitted common and anywhere-for-hire carriers, says Carpenter. No restrictions as to distance, frequency or consideration apply when an "F" plate operator hauls farm products from a farm adjoining his own.

"Operating privileges for 'F' plate holders are more liberal than generally appreciated," says Carpenter. "Most violations arise from unsafe equipment on the highways and from hauling non-agricultural products or supplies."

Postwar Shift in AAA Emphasis Predicted

One of the early functions of the AAA after the war will be to help American farmers adjust to the changes necessary in the switch from wartime to peacetime production, predicted George Weaver, national AAA official who was in Oregon recently helping to prepare the 1945 Oregon handbook of AAA practices. With the advent of the war the AAA changed its emphasis quickly from basic crop control and adjustment to the encouragement of

farming practices which would help insure maximum production with minimum damage to the nation's soil resources, said Weaver. In the same way, it will have to be prepared to adjust to peacetime conditions as soon as the war ends.
