Capt. Ives' Death Accomplished by Tricky Germans

LONDON, Aug. 11 (AP)—

Capt. Norman S. Ives, U. S. director of the port of Cherbourg, and other officers and enlisted men were killed recently in a German ambush near Granville while they were en route to St. Malo.

The navy disclosed the details of Ives' death, which was announced in Washington, this week.

The 47-year-old port commandant was on his way overland in a convoy of 14 motor vehicles to study damage to the waterfront installations at St. Malo, across the bay of Mont St. Michel from positions of hiding. American combat troops previously had cleared through the area.

Survivors reported that the convoy was halted by a mine.

"It looks very respectable, except for the baby buggy. When I enlisted there was a grocery store, wasn't there?"

"Yes. That saloon looks respectable because it was designed to look that way. The windows are arranged so that you can't see the inside easily, and that is a violation of law. Inside is a twenty-six gambling game and the lights are arranged to conceal the bartender is selling to drunks and minors, and for never closes on time; and some of his whiskey is bootleg; all are in violation of the law. It is illegal for the baby to be inside, but it is legal for the mother to be there."

"If the town goes dry do you think a grocery store would move back?"

"Some worth-while business would. Saloons always depress rental values of surrounding properties and create vacancies. A destructive business like this saloon can exist only at the expense of the decent men engaged in selling food, shoes, clothes and beneficial luxuries. Every saloon puts a decent business out, and every saloon that is closed opens the way for a store that helps the community."
