Youths Shying at Salesman Jobs

NEW YORK—(AP)—Business men are concerned that salesmanship careers seem to have lost their allure and blame misadventures held by the public as to the true nature of this essential peacetime work, according to Modern Industry magazine.

Many pre-war salesmen, who gave up order pads to take production jobs in war industries, surveys show, do not intend to return to selling careers.

In order to have full employment after the war, sales executives say, vast quantities of goods must be sold and salesmen by the thousands will be needed to get orders so factories can keep going.

To find out what the rising generation thinks about selling as a career, Modern Industry surveyed high school juniors and seniors and found aversion to selling prevalent.

"The majority of teenage boys and girls have never had a clear idea of what a salesman really does," the magazine reports. They remember mothers who slammed doors on house-to-house canvassers and fathers who ducked out of sight when insurance agents called."

Ex-Premier Blum Executed by Nazis

MOSCOW, Aug. 11—(AP)—Konstantin Simonov, correspondent for the army newspaper Red Star, made public yesterday a story that indicated former Premier Leon Blum of France had died at the Nazis' death factory near Lublin.

Simonov's story of Hitler's biggest enterprise dedicated to the destruction of life said hundreds of thousands of persons, principally Jews, were systematically and methodically killed there since the winter of 1941.

The correspondent said the "extermination camp" consisted of death fields with scientific crematories and a system of galleys which Blum was forced to help build.

A dispatch July 6 from Trun, Spain, said it was understood that Blum and former Minister of Interior Georges Mandel were held in a chateau in central Germany. Lublin, in pre-war southeastern Poland, was captured by the Russians July 24.

Wallace Assured Job if Democrats Win, Report

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Period of Hell is Begun for Reich, Writer Observes

I have before me a letter from a reader hotly advocating the "total extermination" of Germany's population as the only way to insure peace.

That of course represents an extreme (though not rare) viewpoint, and one which I'm sure my correspondent wouldn't back up on a showdown. However, I've yet to encounter anybody who ventured an opinion at all who didn't say he hoped the allied armies would fight their way through the reich so the German people would get overwhelming punishment.

Well, that's an argument we needn't try to settle here. Probably all agree that just but heavy retribution is necessary to prevent repetition of aggression, and in this connection I call attention to the fact that the Fatherland just now is entering a period of chastening which will be hell.

Nazis Face Worst Ordeal
The next few weeks are going to be among the most crucial of the war for Germany. This is the period of the great retreat of Hitler's broken armies to his inner defenses—a catastrophic reversal of the victorious blitzkrieg with which he opened the war.

It's the period which will give the Germans the worst punishment they endured in modern history. They will be undergoing both the strain of their dictator's awful regimentation for total war, and the despair of defeats and retreats.

Thus both military and civilians are about to be put through a fierce test of morale. Der fuhrer will be lucky if they don't crack up.

The defeats the Germans are suffering now are far worse than anything they encountered in the last war. Their casualties in the previous conflict were 7,142,558 and already the present conflagration has claimed an estimated 6,000,000. Countless thousands may die in the next few weeks.

Reserve Pool Exhausted
Talk about annihilating the Germans: the young men who would sire the future generations are being sacrificed by Hitler at fearful rate in a mad effort to delay the surrender which must come. This particularly true on the Russian front where he is using every reserve he can muster. The Muscovites remark grimly that the nazis are being "bled white."

The fuhrer has drained the last drop from his reservoir of reserves. At the outset of the war he maintained in central Germany a pool of maybe 1,500,000 first-line effectives, ready to be flung in any direction. The latest loss of Nazi divisions on the Normandy front shows that not a single unit has been drawn recently from Germany. They come from Denmark, Holland, Galicia, Poland and many parts of France—but nary one from the reich. The pool is gone.

George Hamilton, Farmer Of Yoncalla, Passes

George Hamilton, 75, died in Salem Tuesday after a long illness. He was born in Concord, Mich., July 26, 1869, and for the last 25 years had been a resident of Yoncalla, where for the most of the time he was engaged in farming.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary F. Hamilton, two sons and two daughters, Mrs. Helen Hamilton and Mrs. George Thompson, Yoncalla; Thomas Hamilton, Roseburg, and Delbert Hamilton, Camp, Ore., Calif.

Services will be held in the Methodist church, Yoncalla, Saturday at 2 p. m. Rev. Fred O. Hunt, officiating. Interment will be in Yoncalla cemetery. Arrangements are in care of the Stearns mortuary, Oakland.

Religious Editor Will Speak at Myrtle Creek On Postwar Programs

Arrangements for Mr. Peterson to speak in Myrtle Creek were made by Dr. Silas E. Fairham, superintendent of the Cascade district of the Oregon Methodist conference, when he learned the editor was slated for a Sunday morning address in Medford. He will stop in Myrtle Creek en route back to Portland.

Mr. Peterson recently was one of two lay delegates to represent Oregon Methodists at the general conference of the denomination in Kansas City. There he had a part in formulating the postwar objectives of the church.

Since then he represented Oregon at the western jurisdictional conference of the church at Salt Lake City, where he was elected chairman of the ad interim council which is to work out a postwar program for the Methodist church in 10 western states, Hawaii and Alaska.

Mr. Peterson's subject will be "Methodism Faces the Future." Mr. Peterson has indicated that he will comply with a request from Dr. Fairham to outline some of the postwar plans of the denomination.

Swim Classes To Begin Here Monday

Classes in swimming and lifesaving will begin Monday, Aug. 14, at the Mosher street swimming pool. It was announced today by Mel Ingram, supervisor of the summer recreation program. All students will be required to have certificates showing completion of typhoid inoculations.

The schedule of classes is announced as follows: Beginners, 2 to 3 p. m.; advanced swimming, 3 to 4 p. m.; lifesaving, 4 to 5 p. m. Classes will be conducted daily except Sunday.

All beginners, both youths and adults, are requested to be on hand promptly at 2 o'clock. In the event there are enough students, classes will be divided with youths from 2 to 2:30 and adults from 2:30 to 3 o'clock.

All lifesaving students, both junior and senior, are to be present at 4 o'clock. These classes too will be divided if attendance is large enough to permit. Classes will run for 10 days, Aug. 14 to Aug. 19 and Aug. 21 to 24.
