

Swatfest Won by Young's; Ellison Hurls No-Hitter

Softball fans saw one of the best battles of the season last night as Young's Bay defeated the Sutherlin Caribous, 13 to 12, in a seven-inning extra-inning contest. Both teams were trying desperately for victory and with the score close all of the way, the spectators were furnished a real treat.

In the opening game, Bud Ellison, pitching a no-hitter for Dunham's, was robbed of a shutout by an error at the plate. Roseburg Lumber batters were unable to get a single hit off Ellison's delivery, but a walked runner scored from third on an infield error of the plate when the catcher dropped the ball. Dunham batters had a field day as they landed on Blake for eight hits, which coupled with poor support in the field, gave the Transformers an 11 to 1 victory.

The second game was a wild affair from the second inning through the eighth. Young's Bay scored two runs in the second inning, when Mitchell walked and Willener hit a home run. Sutherlin, however, promptly tied the score, when Miner walked and scored on Culver's two-bagger. Culver, in turn, scoring on a three-bagger by Vang. The score remained tied in the third, each scoring one run. Two errors, a walk and three hits—one a home run by Loomis—put Young's Bay out in front with a score of 8 to 3 in the fourth, but the fighting Caribous promptly retaliated in their half of the frame with four runs, as the result of a walk, error and two hits, one a double by Marden.

Both teams went scoreless in the fifth, and each scored three runs in the sixth, a homer by Todd and a three-bagger by Willener featuring the Young's Bay half of the frame. The Millers crowded over another run in the seventh to take a two-run lead, 10 to 3, but their efforts were nullified in the last of the seventh when successive hits by Vang, Rice and Baughman tied the score.

In the extra inning, Mitchell scored the winning run by lifting a two-bagger, while third on a passed ball and racing home after the catch of Willener's outfield fly.

Sutherlin cut two runners on bases in the last half of the eighth, but fast infield plays by Young's Bay cut off scoring opportunities.

Cordon Discusses Lamb Rationing, Shortage of Tires

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (AP)—Senator Guy Cordon, who has returned to Washington to take part in the enactment of reconversion legislation, says he favors the bill of Senator George to turn handling of unemployment compensation over to the states.

Cordon said on his return that he planned to discuss with government officials at once his recommendation that lamb be removed from rationing in Oregon to relieve markets now glutted with meat. Unless this is done, he said, a serious injury will be done producers.

He said another problem confronting the state's industry is the lack of heavy tires for lumber trucks. Unless some way is found to increase production so the lumber industry can get truck tires, he said, a 25 per cent reduction in lumber production will result in thirty days and more than 30 per cent reduction in sixty days.

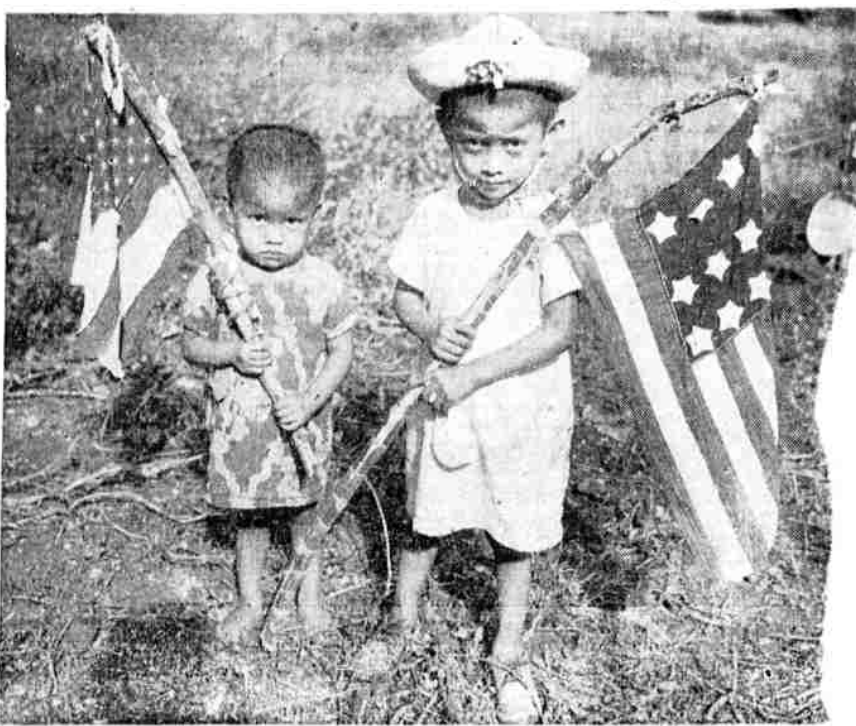

Roosevelt Party Visits Wounded in Hawaiian Military Hospitals



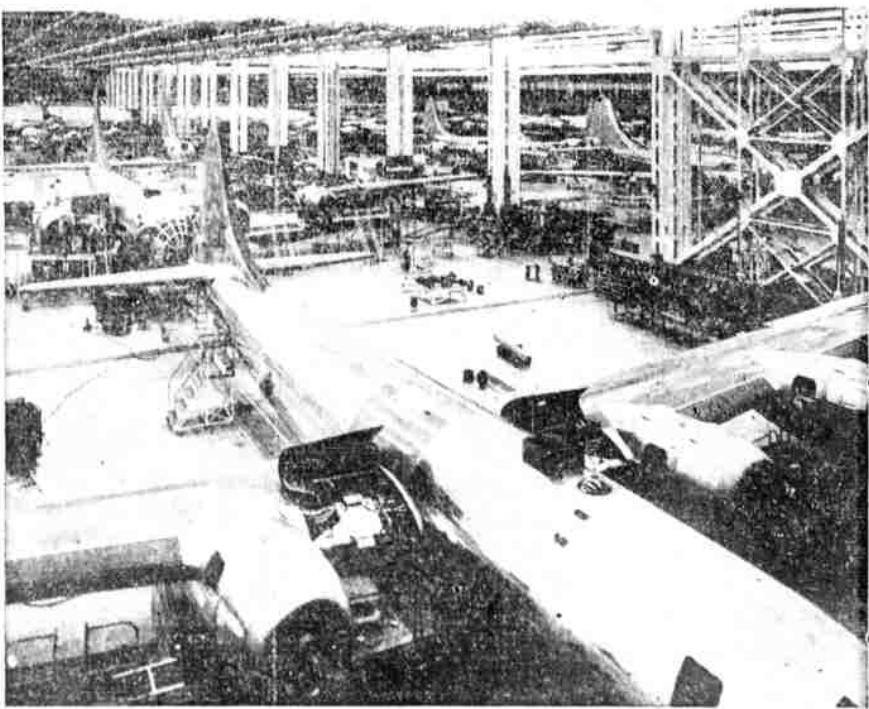

edly have reported that French forces have been massed on Corsica for an amphibious operation.

The bombing attack yesterday coincided with Prime Minister Churchill's arrival in Italy. The Italian press suggested that his visit was a sign of the importance the Italian war theater "may assume in the near future."

The Germans withdrew all their forces from Florence, possibly to strengthen their positions farther north. The withdrawal snared "the Athens of Italy" from the ravages of battle.

The Germans have reported frequently without confirmation that allied amphibious forces have maneuvered off France's southern coast and have displayed concern over a possible allied thrust up the Rhone valley, the lifeline of southern France.

London newsmen enthusiastically acclaimed the spectacular American operations in France. They published a wholly unconfirmed report that doughboy units had reached the "outskirts of Paris."

The Berlin radio acknowledged today that the Americans had reached Alencon, about 30 miles north of Le Mans, and rushed on several miles north. The broadcast also said the Germans had abandoned the towns of Normandy and Suresval in the Normandy pocket where the Americans have beaten down strong counter-attacks.

The U. S. air force kept up the campaign to isolate Paris by blasting at enemy installations around the capital. About 1,000 bombers attacked airfields in the Paris area as well as railroad yards at Metz. The RAF again pounded Berlin in a night attack and also struck at Givors, a rail junction 200 miles southeast of Paris.

programs at federal expense, and sets up a federal loan fund to guarantee the solvency of the state funds, but leaves full control of unemployment insurance rates to the states.

The Murray-Kilgore bill would have created more elaborate reconversion machinery, fixed uniform insurance rates as high as \$25 weekly, provided for federal-financed vocational training for idle persons and substantial boosts mustering out pay and cashless payments to returning war veterans.

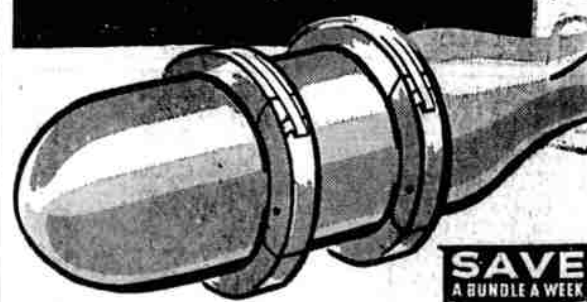
