Marseille, is a historic route for invading France from the south. The air attack in Norway could be a diversion to fool the Germans.

ALL this, please remember, is the purest kind of guesswork. But the time is here to hit the Germans at every possible point.

WE'VE CROSSED THE LOIRE somewhere between Nantes and Angers, apparently—and are heading into southern France.

FOR whatever it may mean, Churchill, U. S. Assistant Secretary of War Patterson and General Somervell, head of American supply services, are in ITALY.

It is rather generally believed that an American blitz spearhead is pushing north from Le Mans to GET BEHIND the Germans massed in the Caen area.

Instead of getting out, dispatches from our headquarters in France report that Marshal von Kluge (German commander in France) is reported "recklessly throwing the bulk of his west wall forces into the area below Caen, despite the development of an allied encirclement threat."

German prisoners taken there say they have orders to withdraw ONLY on authorization from Hitler's headquarters.

OVER and over again in Russia Hitler has ordered his troops to stand and die but GIVE NO GROUND. Over and over, they have stood and died. They're standing and dying in the Baltic states now. Der fuhrner is apparently ordering them to stand and die at Caen.

One gets unavoidably the impression of a frightened and shivering little man covering in his Bechtelsgaden hideout while he issues frantic orders to his armies to stand and die to keep him from being CAUGHT AND HANGED.

THE Russians are pulling the old one-two punch tactics (of which they are masters) on the Germans in East Prussia.

They first aimed a thrust along East Prussia's Baltic coast. As soon as Nazi forces had been drawn there to MEET IT, they hit with TWO ARMIES from the south, in Poland, German armor, which had been massed along the Baltic to stop the Russians there, was shifted FEVERISHLY to the south to meet the NEW danger.

EVERY tennis player knows that when he can get his opponent running frantically from one side of the court to the other, trying to meet well-placed shots, he has him where he WANTS HIM, and the end isn't far off.

"GERMANY WILL WIN THE WAR"

ON the day of her surrender, Germany will be the victor in this war.

Such is the startling statement made by Ben Ames Williams, noted novelist and reporter. Williams says:

Germany won World War I. When the armistice comes, she will have won this one. Even unconditional surrender is only a phrase, without real meaning.

In Europe before 1939, Germany had the largest cohesive population; she had the largest industrial plant; she possessed at least half of Europe's total "worth" in people and plant.

Since 1939, she has increased that proportion. From the point of view of population, she has killed at least one non-German for every German who has been killed; she has transported hundreds of thousands more; and she has undoubtedly won among the conquered peoples many converts.

By using to the break-down point the industries of conquered countries tributary feeders to Germany's industrial needs, her industrial predominance in Europe is greater now than it was before 1939. Only an honest recognition of this fact can make possible the framing of a peace which will deprive her of victory.

The nazis already are preparing for another war. They know they are whipped, but they do not propose to remain beaten any longer than it takes them to organize another attempt to conquer the world.

As pointed out by Williams, the Germans are destroying industrial resources and manpower in conquered nations. Because of her vandalism she will be, even in defeat, a stronger nation than those about her.

Germany also is preparing politically for the future. The Nazi party is determined to survive even the humiliation of defeat and national economic disaster. Germany is to become the "hoodlum" nation of the world.

Her youth have been trained for nearly three generations to be beasts. All trace of morality has been eliminated from their culture. They have no respect for the "weaker" emotions. They have been steeped in their own "superman" doctrines. They will never be whipped in spirit. Although overwhelmed by superior force, they will retain the belief that by trickery, sabotage and destructiveness they will be able to win next time.

Beaten by force of arms, the nazis will go underground. While their political "front" cooperates in international affairs, the hidden forces will be endeavoring to destroy.

We have in allied hands today hundreds of thousands of German prisoners. The majority of these men are still nazis. They are arrogant, vain, boastful men. They have been captured, but they have not been killed. When the war is over we will send them back to their homeland to become international hoodlums.

Hitler is even now stamping out the last vestiges of anti-Nazi leadership. The Prussian guard which through centuries has placed military above political prowess is being wiped out by internal purge as well as by allied bullets. Postwar Germany will remain Nazi, even though hidden hands control the reins.

The determination of the peace will be difficult. There should be no place at the peace table for idealism. The question, therefore, arises: Should the United States be represented by a man who knows the criminal mind and who, as a former prosecuting attorney, knows methods of dealing with criminals, or by one who is a great humanitarian, a missionary crusader and an idealistic do-gooder?

It is our nature, as a nation, to be tolerant and forgiving, to be helpful and sympathetic. But at the same time we must be practical. You can't convert swine to the religion of humanitarianism.

that point now: SOME significant statistics: In the 48 hours up to mid night Thursday, our Americans in France took more than 10,000 German prisoners. This is beginning to look like demoralization.

From 6 o'clock Saturday up to mid-afternoon, allied fighter-bombers in France destroyed 13 locomotives and 1059 railroad cars. In the week ending Saturday, they have destroyed or damaged 587 locomotives and 4459 railroad cars.

In a war of movement, where transportation means everything, that is something.

WITH the battle of France rushing to its crisis, the battle of the pay-off rages furiously in Washington (its objective is VOTES).

The New Deal-sponsored Murray-Kilgore bill (which included \$35 a week postwar pay for war workers as compared with the GI bill of rights bill's \$25 a week for service men) comes up in the senate and gets swamped under a torrent of adverse votes.

Washington dispatches report that the New Dealers turned desperately to the house in the hope of saving their case there, but that several members of the house ways and means committee announced that they are AGAINST the Murray-Kilgore bill and FOR the George state rights plan.

The George state's rights plan proposes weekly payments of \$13 to \$22 out of regular unemployment funds. The Murray-Kilgore payments would have been made out of DIRECT federal appropriations.

Starving Italians Eat Grass, Writes Cpl. H. C. Bradford

If striking laborers in the United States could see Italians eating grass to keep from starving to death, "they could see how much better off they are!" writes Corporal Henry Chester Bradford, formerly of Roseburg in a letter to his wife, who resides in Eugene. Corporal Bradford is a son of Mrs. G. E. Davis, who resides in the Lane mountain district, east of Roseburg.

In the letter, Corporal Bradford asks for pictures of timber and logging trucks. As the only Oregon man in his company and as a former logger truck driver, he has been telling his comrades about Oregon's big trees, but has a hard time convincing them that "such trees grow in God's country."

A former student in Roseburg high school, Bradford entered the service in the spring of 1942 and went overseas in August of that year. He served in Africa and Sicily and is now with an anti-aircraft artillery group in Italy.

Born in Newton, Ia., he came to Oregon in 1902. He held degrees from Central

Wesleyan college, Boston University and Kansas Wesleyan University, and was an ex-college professor.

He came here five years ago and was in the hotel business for a time. Survivors include the widow; a daughter, Mrs. Dean Walker of Independence; a son, Edward W. Miller, Jr., of Piedmont, Calif.; a stepson, Leslie Whitehouse of Eugene; two sisters and a brother.
