I SAW

A FALLING TREE majestically yielding to the persuasive tactics of a couple of Roseburg Lumber company fallers in the woods on Mt. Scott. The tree was 39 inches in diameter at the butt and was felled in six minutes by the fallers, using a Timberhog chain saw. The saw wasn't at its sharpest, either, 22 trees having previously been felled with it that day.

Note the extreme length of the trunk shown above. Free of any limbs whatever, this feature is characteristic of a vast amount of the timber in that locality and not only makes for easier bucking, but for a fine grade of lumber.

The company now is conducting logging operations on three sides of Mt. Scott. From the highest of these, at an elevation of 3,500 feet, the nearby summit of the mountain looks like a little hill, instead of the bold, majestic height it presents at a distance.

At the present annual cut (approximately 38 million feet) the Roseburg Lumber company has an ample stand here to run it for the next five years. The entire area under control is serviced by 25 miles of heavily rocked, finely surfaced roads, all except those at the higher elevations, which are susceptible to snow, capable of sustaining year-round hauling. A ten-mile system of dirt laterals reach to outlying timber stands which are logged during the summer months.

Free Hunting, Fishing for Furloughed Men Asked

A protest has been filed by Philatellian lodge No. 8, I. O. O. F., Roseburg, against collection of the full amount for hunting and fishing licenses from service men home on furlough. Protests have been filed with the state game commission and Governor Earl Snell. It is urged that service men home on furloughs be furnished with licenses without cost or for a nominal charge.

"The argument is that the boys, when home, like some recreation in order to forget the rigors of war," said Frank H. Beels, lodge press representative. "A trip to the many fishing spots in our county, amid the choice scenery, is found to be a great relief. We feel the state could well afford to make them a special concession, particularly in view of the fact that their furloughs are of very brief duration."

French Patriots' Uprising Brings Chaos to Quislings

LONDON, Aug. 16—(AP)—Underground forces, inspired by the allied landings along the Riviera and growing German rout in Normandy, were reported rising everywhere throughout France today in a swelling tide of revolt against Nazi forces which have held the French people in bondage for more than four years.

Dispatches from Spain quoted advisers from the French border as saying that the Maquis had launched a series of attacks upon German garrisons in southern France as soon as they received news of the allied landings.

Serious German resistance was expected at Limoges, these advisers said, but the other towns mentioned were reported manned by garrisons of less than 1,000 men each.

The German commanders of Pau, near the Spanish frontier, and at Toulouse, capital of the whole south-central area, were sent ultimatum demanding their immediate surrender.

Quislings Try To Flee Vichy meanwhile, was reported in a turmoil, with collaborationists attempting to flee the city and armed guards patrolling the streets. The AFI (Independent French agency) quoted a dispatch from Bern as saying 10,000 French patriots were "advancing toward Vichy" and that they were being joined en route by hundreds of recruits.

The same dispatch asserted that other patriot forces of the interior were moving on Bordeaux.

In Paris, the populace was said to have gone wild with joy at news of the allied landings along the Riviera, and some reports from the French border said sporadic fighting had broken out in the streets between collaborationists and patriots who assembled in the streets singing the "Marseillaise." German police were reported unable to control spontaneous patriot demonstrations.

A Madrid dispatch to the Daily Mail said the Germans had made bonfires of army archives and files of Vichy officials to keep them from allied hands.

The German-controlled Monte Carlo radio declared the Germans had clamped a strict curfew on southern France, forbidding civilians from using the streets from sunset to dawn and banning vehicular traffic. All places of entertainment were shut down and sale of alcoholic beverages was forbidden.

Rift is Friendly, Barbara Explains

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 16—(AP)—Barbara Hutton Grant says her separation from her husband, actor Cary Grant, is a friendly one, decided upon by both after much and careful thought.

"I am sorry that our marital misunderstandings has made this step necessary," the dime-store heiress added in a statement yesterday. "There is no thought of divorce at the present time, and Cary and I are remaining the fondest of friends."

Grant's comment was: "Yes, I regret to say that it is all true. You can quite understand why I have no inclination to make an extended statement."

Mrs. Grant, 31, formerly was married to Alexis M'Divani, Georgian prince, and later to Count Flugwitz-Reventlow, former Danish count with whom she is contending for custody of their son, Lance, 9, Grant, 40, is the former husband of Virginia Cherrill, British actress.

Request for Nazi Labor Dropped at Unions' Plea

SALFEM Ore, Aug. 16—(AP)—Marion and Polk county canneries today withdrew their request for German prisoners to help relieve their critical labor shortage.

Objections by cannery unions was responsible for withdrawal of the request. The union, however, promised it would recruit enough local labor to operate the canneries.

The canneries said they need 800 men and 1000 men for the next few weeks.
