## World Coercion Fear of Dewey is Allayed by Hull

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17—(AP)

Secretary of State Hull said today that the Big Four powers do not contemplate coercion of the world and that "Governor Dewey can rest assured that the fears which he expressed in his statement are utterly and completely unfounded."

In a formal statement Hull replied to one issued yesterday by

the republican presidential nominee, in which Dewey expressed fears that the four major powers—Britain, Russia, China and the United States—might "coerce" the rest of the world in setting up plans for postwar peace assured by force.

Hull's comment came as proposals for a sort of regionalized responsibility for peace on the part of the big four nations were heard in advance of next week's security talks at the Dubarton Oaks estate here.

Secretary Hull said: "No arrangement such as described by him (Dewey) which would involve a military alliance of the four major nations per-

manently to coerce the rest of the world, is contemplated or has ever been contemplated by this government, or as far as we know, by any of the other governments."

Teheran Promise Cited Hull recalled that in the Moscow declaration the four nations placed themselves on record as advocating a "general international organization, based on the principle of sovereign equality of all peace-loving states and open to membership of all such states large and small, for the maintenance of international peace and security."

The secretary emphasized that his statement was embodied in

the Connally resolution "passed in the United States senate by an overwhelming bi-partisan vote of 85 to 5."

### U. S.-Japanese Soldier Is Awarded D. S. C.

ROME, Aug. 17—(AP)—Undersecretary of War Robert C. Patterson planned two distinguished service crosses yesterday on infantrymen who joined American artillery b a t t e r y pumping shells into German positions across the Arno river during a tour of the Fifth army front.

DSC was awarded for heroism

under fire to Lt. Yelki Kobashigawa of Hawaii, who with another soldier was responsible for neutralizing four German machine gun nests, capturing six nazis and killing another near Lanuvio on June 2.

Exactly 26 years ago today, Patterson himself was decorated with the distinguished service cross.

The undersecretary spent much time talking with members of the Japanese-American 100th battalion. He told Capt. Youngo Kim, Los Angeles, the battalion's most decorated warrior, that his officers and men "should be grateful for an opportunity to serve under you."
