

### Suhr's Bat Breaks S. F. Losing Streak

### Japanese Soldier Of U. S., Wounded, Thanks Benefactor

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16—(AP)—"The evening sun is low and once again from a lonely bed in a hospital, I'm sending my deepest Aloha to you and I'm praying that this missile finds you and your beloved ones in the best of health."  
That is how a letter written from overseas by a wounded Japanese-American soldier of Hawaii's famed 442nd regiment begins.

It is addressed to Earl Finch, Hattiesburg, Miss., farmer, who has become a legend to thousands of Hawaii lads because of the many kindnesses he bestowed on them when they trained at Camp Shelby, Miss., before entering battle against the Germans in Europe.  
The letter, written on Red Cross stationery, continues:  
"Yes, Mr. Finch, I was wounded for the second time, but I'm coming along fine. And—at the last request of my comrades killed in action—I'm sending you a special message.  
"In the last push, Mr. Finch, just before I was hit, several of my men died in my arms. Through gasping breath and blood, one of their last wishes, Mr. Finch, was, 'Tell Mr. Finch aloha and good luck.'  
"We have never forgotten you, Mr. Finch. We will never forget you to the last—your sympathy, your kindness.  
"So with the last message of your brave friends—till we meet again I bid aloha and good luck.  
"In appreciation. (Name omitted.)"

### Eastern, Southern States Promised Heat Wave Relief

Easterners and southerners, perspiring unhappily in a protracted above-90-degree hot spell, looked hopefully to the west and middlewest today where some cooler temperatures indicated relief might reach the heat-baked east by Friday or Saturday.  
Minnesota and the Dakotas re-

ported cool weather, while in Chicago thundershowers cut record heat yesterday and were expected to keep temperatures down today.  
New York and New England continued to swelter in a week-long heat wave. Boston reported six consecutive days of record breaking temperatures for each day. Maine woods were closed as fire raged through thousands of acres of tinder-dry forests.  
But new York meteorologist Benjamin Parry said low temperatures in the west and midwest meant that cooler weather, originally scheduled for the east to-

day, might be expected Friday.  
For the 44th consecutive day, Ohioans suffered above-90 heat, but showers cooled Michigan and real relief was predicted in that area for tomorrow.  
It was the hottest August ever recorded by the New York weather bureau, and Boston expected that all records in its history for consecutive days of heat would be broken today with a predicted 96 degree temperature.  
Many temperatures recorded in the east early today were running two or three degrees higher than yesterday.

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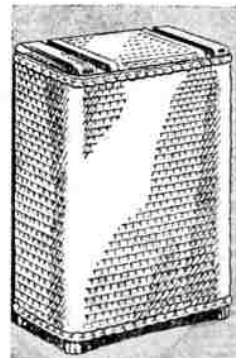
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
