Special Payments For Pear Canning Ordered by WFA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18—(AP)—The War Food Administration yesterday announced it is authorizing equalization payments to permit canners outside of pear producing areas in the northwest to help process an unexpected surplus of Bartlett pears this season and sell them within ceiling prices.

Designed to encourage maximum production in order to meet civilian demands more fully the program will provide equalization payments to canners whose bids are accepted by the office of distribution.

WFA said these payments would permit canners to pay support prices to the surplus area and allow sale of the fruit within ceiling prices.

The payment date, WFA said, will be determined on the basis of bids submitted by canners, who will be required to state the price they are able to pay for pears in specified areas outside their normal area of supply.

All payments will be made through the Commodity Credit corporation.

Salvation Army Heads In Roseburg Transferred

Captain Norma Koon and Lt. Betty Lee Smith, officers in charge of The Salvation Army in Roseburg, have received orders to go to the Southern California division. Captain Koon will be succeeded here by Captain Alma Crotty, who is coming from Washington.

The official date of the change is not certain at this time, but is expected to be some time after Aug. 27.

Though looking forward to new opportunities in California, Captain Koon regrets having to leave Roseburg and the many fine contacts and friendships she has made in her two-year stay here, she states.

The captain desires, she says, to thank everyone in the county for cooperation and support toward the work of The Salvation Army during her stay in Roseburg.

School Merger Plan in Drew District Rejected

Proposed consolidation of schools serving the upper and lower Drew districts was defeated at a recent election, according to a canvass of the vote today by the school district board.

Patrons of the upper district unanimously approved consolidation by a vote of 6 to 0, but the vote in the lower district was tied, 8 to 8, thus defeating the proposal, which required a majority vote in each district.

Pupils from the upper district have been transferred to the lower district school in the past, and it is anticipated the same arrangement will prevail during the coming school year.

Four Juveniles Jailed Here on Theft Charges

Four juveniles, 15 and 16 years of age, are being held in the county jail, two for automobile theft and two for burglary, Sheriff Ed Carter reported today. Identity of the youths was not revealed.

Two Portland boys, the sheriff said, were apprehended at Crescent City, Calif., driving a pickup truck allegedly stolen from Myrtle Creek.

Two California youths, apparently imbued with a Wild West complex, reportedly broke into a home in Graves creek, where they stole two antique rifles and other personal property, and then proceeded to Glendale, where they stole a horse. They were riding double on the stolen animal when taken into custody.

Infantile Paralysis Hits Rev. Sylwester's Son

The first case of infantile paralysis to be reported in Douglas county during the current statewide epidemic was announced today by Dr. E. J. Wainwright, county health officer, who stated that the illness of the 11-year old son of Rev. and Mrs. W. A. Sylwester, Roseburg, has been diagnosed as infantile paralysis.

The child is being taken today to Downbecher hospital in Portland. Numerous cases have been reported throughout the state, the majority of them being of a mild nature, Dr. Wainwright said. It is anticipated that the epidemic will be ended with the first fall rains.

M. H. Dinsmore, Spanish War Veteran, Passes
