PATCH AND CHAT CLUB HAS MEETING

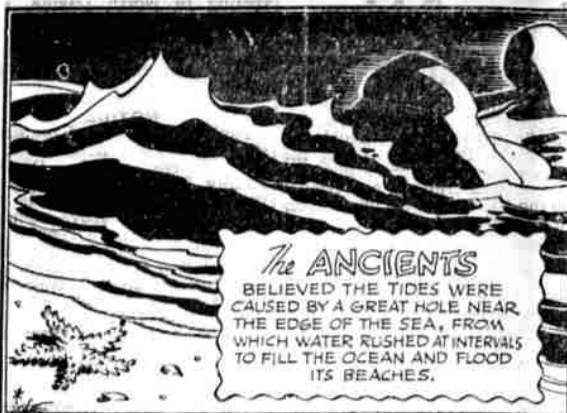

Strike Chief at Govt. Held Mine Sentenced

LEXINGTON, Ky., Aug. 17—(AP)—James Aaron Thacker, former president of a United Mine Workers local union at Middletown, was sentenced in federal district court here yesterday to two concurrent one-year terms in prison on charges of violating the War Labor disputes act in connection with a coal strike at a government-operated mine in Bell county last year. Thacker pleaded guilty July 5 to charges of inciting miners to strike at the Premier Jellico company mine at Middlesboro last year while that mine was operated by the federal government.
