Free Round Trip Transportation is Arranged for Roseburg Blood Donors; Red Cross Office Sets Interview Date

Plans have been completed to provide transportation for a large group of Roseburg blood donors to and from Portland, in the event a sufficient number of persons apply and are accepted, it was announced today by Mrs. Eugene Peterson, chairman of the blood donor committee.

Mrs. Violet Hannan, executive secretary of the Douglas county Red Cross chapter, has arranged to charter a bus for the trip and will be able to provide transportation for either 25 or 37 persons, as the size of the bus to be secured will be determined by the number of applicants.

Persons willing to become blood donors are requested to apply at the Red Cross office, room 415 Pacific building, between 12 noon and 5:30 p. m. Tuesday, Aug. 22. Each person will be interviewed to determine whether there is any reason his or her blood would not be suitable.

Those accepted as donors will leave Roseburg the morning of Tuesday, Aug. 22. Arrangements have been made with the Red Cross blood donor service to collect blood from the Roseburg group Tuesday afternoon. Reservations will be made at the Mallory hotel for all members of the party. All making the trip will be expected to pay for their own meals and hotel rooms, but transportation will be furnished with out charge. The bus will leave early Wednesday afternoon on the return trip.

Any person, who is in good health, between the ages of 18 to 60 and who weighs more than 110 pounds may contribute one pint of blood. Those between the ages of 18 and 21 years must have parental consent.

The time required is approximately one hour. A test is first made to determine if the donor's blood is satisfactory. Actual taking of the blood requires less than five minutes. After a brief rest and stimulating refreshments, the donor is permitted to leave.

The process involves no pain and is conducted under direction of competent physicians, all danger to the donor being eliminated.

Blood contributed by donors is shipped to commercial laboratories, where it is processed into plasma and then delivered to the army and navy for distribution to the battlefronts and military hospitals all over the world.

Contributions of blood are credited with saving the lives of thousands of men who have been wounded in combat. Anyone desiring more specific information concerning local plans is invited to contact the Red Cross office, phone 633-L. It is not necessary to make advance
