William Wise, 92, died in a Eugene hospital last night after a short illness. He was born in Illinois, Sept. 1, 1852, and had been a resident of Oregon for the last 86 years and had lived at Drain

for the last 25 years. He was a retired farmer and was a member of the Methodist church and Maccabee lodge and is well-known.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Clementina Wise; a daughter, Mrs. A. Trumbull, Bandon, and a son, Wm. N. Wise, Eugene. Services will be held in the Drain Methodist church Tuesday, at 2 p. m. Rev. Fred O. Hunt officiating. Interment will be in the L. O. O. F. cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of the Stearns mortuary, Oakland.

REEDSPORT, Ore., Aug. 20—Arriving at his home in Reedsport Friday, Richard Henry, who has been on duty with the navy in the South Pacific, learned that at the time he passed through Honolulu on his way home, his brother, W.
