Charge of Threat To Kill Faced by Ralph W. Oakes

REEDSPORT, Ore., Aug. 21.—Ralph Williams Oakes, 28, reported to own a small farm east of Roseburg, was arraigned in the Reedsport justice court Saturday on a charge of making a threat to kill. The complaining witness was Mrs. Thelma Governor, wife of a service man in the South Pacific and mother of two small children.

Mrs. Governor stated that she had become acquainted with Oakes while living at Roseburg and that when she moved to Reedsport to make her home with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Chance, Oakes assisted in the moving and also remained at Reedsport, Judge Fred Wright reported.

The woman told the court, Judge Wright stated, that Oakes made advances and on several occasions threatened to kill her.

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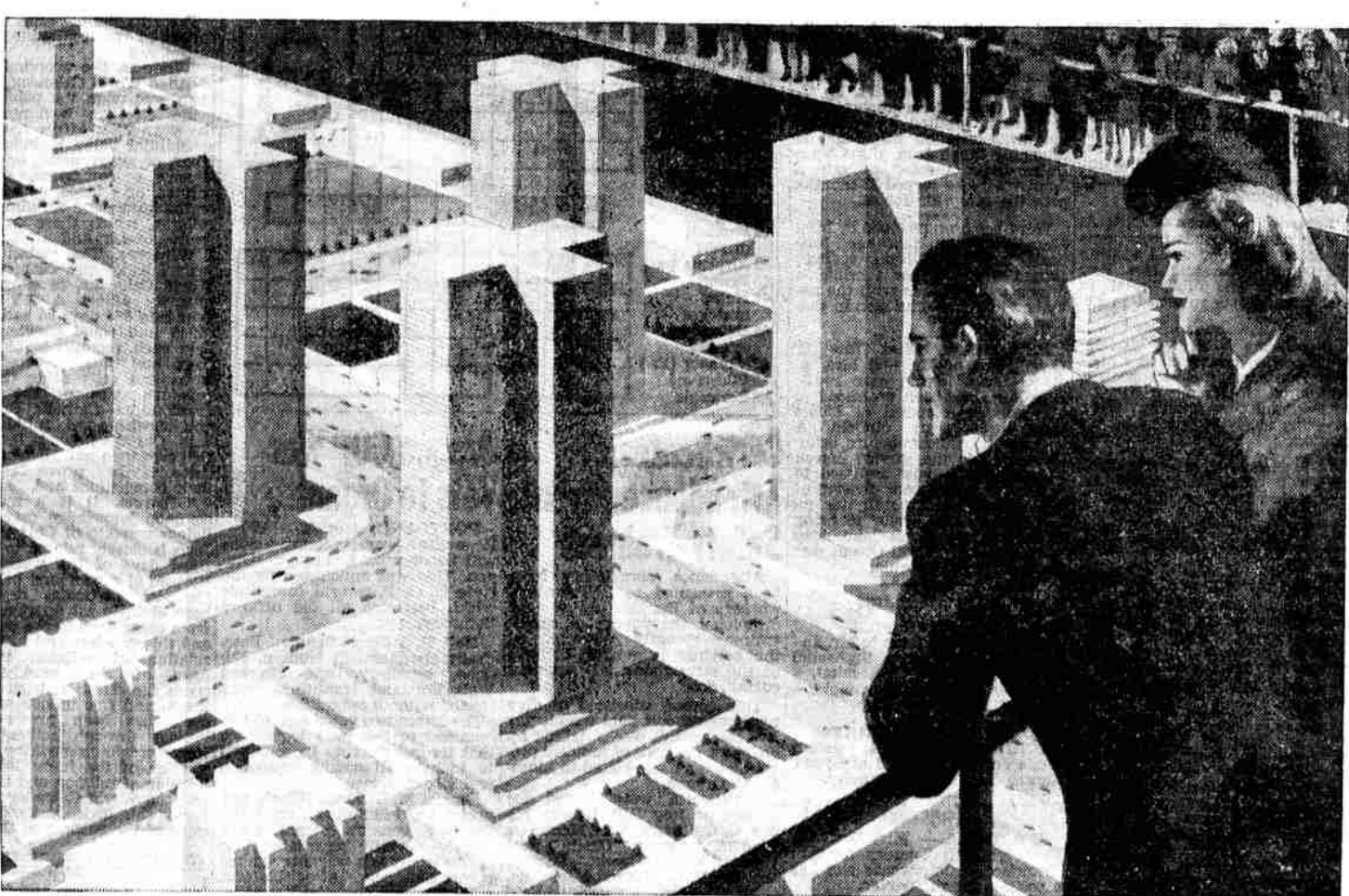
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
