Sactos Win From Beavers; League's Top Hurler Sold

The Coast League Sacramento Solons won a game from the Portland Beavers, 5 to 3, last night but lost a star hurler in a deal that sends Southpaw Clem Dreisewerd to the Boston Red Sox of the American League.

Dreisewerd, a 20-game winner for the Solons, left last night to join the second place Red Sox.

The Solons won their game with a five-run second inning affair. The Beavers had opened up in the first frame with three tallies. All five Sacramento's runs were unearned, coming in on three singles followed by three walks and two errors.

Seattle staged an eighth inning rally to score three times and defeat San Diego, 4 to 3, after the Padres had taken a two-run lead in their half of the same inning.

Hollywood narrowed Los Angeles' league lead to five games with a 7 to 3 win. Blanton saved the game for the Stars with tight hurling in both the eighth and ninth innings, retiring the Angels without a tally both times after the bases were loaded.

Blanton did not receive credit for the win as Kimball hurled the first seven frames.

U. S. Bomber Crash in Britain Kills 50 Persons

LONDON, Aug. 23.—(AP)—An American bomber crashed flaming into the Lancashire village of Freckleton today, killing at least 50 persons, 34 of them small children at a church school. The toll may be much higher.

At least three of the bomber's crew were killed.

There were 43 children at the school and few were reported as alive from the wreckage.

Some of the dead children were evacuees from London, fuel from Hitler's robot bombs.

city has a population of approximately 100,000 and is a rail center on the Paris-Lyon-Marseille route. It also commands access to important mountain passes in eastern France.

The Americans also were in position, by striking westward, to cut off German units reported fleeing from the Mediterranean beachhead along the Rhone valley—main route to northern France.

Battle Rages in Toulon.

On the Mediterranean coast, a bitter battle still raged in encircled Toulon. French armor and infantry had pushed virtually into the outskirts of Marseille, and the French occupied Hyeres east of Toulon.

The allied command announced that the total number of prisoners taken since the landings had risen to more than 17,000.
