INSPIRING SERVICE SUNDAY MORNING

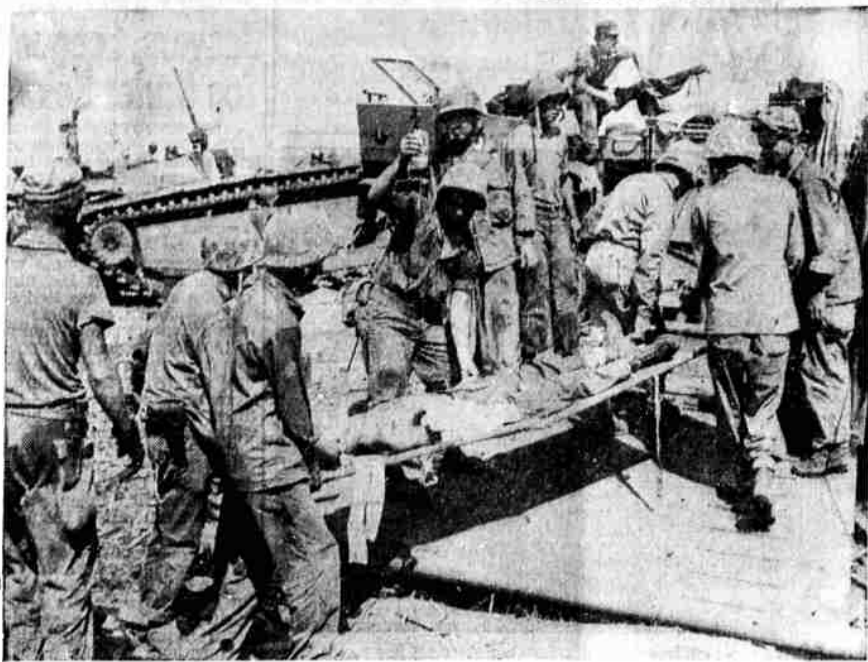

Newsmen, Artist Are Ousted From Front in France

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Three American war correspondents and one artist accredited to the Ninth air force in France have been ordered out of that theater of war "apparently because their work has not measured up to standards set by publicity minded Ninth air force officers in the higher ranks," the New York Tribune said today in a copyrighted dispatch.

The correspondents were Stanley Frank of the New York Post, Gordon Gammack of the Des Moines Register and Lee McCandell of the Baltimore Sun, and John Groth, artist for Parade.

"The order is the aftermath of a long series of threats indulged in by certain public relations officers of the air force," Herald Tribune Correspondent Jack Tait wrote. "Correspondents have been told that they threaten to cover the bulk of their air force news. Those who did not, it was made clear, would have to seek reassignment elsewhere."

The order was signed by Col. Robert Parham, in charge of the air force's public relations, and contained no explanation for the action, the newspaper said.

On several occasions in the past, the Herald Tribune said, correspondents were told that if they failed to devote the bulk of their effort toward Ninth air force copy, they would lose their accreditation.
