Paris Battle Renewed as Nazis Break Armistice

tattered ominously after Roman in a dramatic capitulation. At this dark hour for Germany, allied planes struck fiercely at a German "Dunkelke" attempt to flee the tightening Seine trap from Le Havre at the river's mouth. An undetermined number of ships in the fleet of light service warships and other vessels was sunk or damaged.

On the west, France speedily was being torn from faltering Nazi grasp. The noose tightened on Germans enveloped below the lower Seine; U. S. troops south-east of Paris pursued the enemy within 150 miles of the German frontier; Geneva reports put Americans already at the Swiss border in swift inland lunges from the southern invasion; Bordeaux was reported fallen to allied troops and to French patriots, who were rising nearly everywhere to cast off Nazi domination. France was one-third or more liberated.

Nazi Border Now Goal

Driving 25 miles down the Seine, U. S. columns seized Elbeuf, only 30 miles from the river's mouth and nine from the big city of Rouen. Canadian, British and American armies crossed in the western and southern ends of the noose on 90,000 Nazis. Planes wrecked 500 enemy vehicles and 15 river escape barges. Other Americans curving south-east of Paris punched within less than 150 miles of the German frontier, pushing beyond Sens. Two more spearheads were put over the upper Seine near Fontainebleau.

The Liberators in the south captured Salon, 25 miles northwest of French-run Marseille, and near the Rhone river highway. French patriots were reported to have seized the region around Lyon 240 miles southwest of the capital.

Courage Wins Badge For Tiller Soldier

WITH THE 25TH INFANTRY DIVISION IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC, Sergeant Ronald V. DeWitt, mortar squad leader with the 25th infantry division in the South Pacific and son of Mrs. Nettie Rainville, Tiller, Ore., has been awarded the Combat Infantryman Badge for courage, initiative and aggressiveness in action against the Japanese.

A 1930 graduate of Days Creek high school, Sgt. DeWitt was a woodsman for the Rogue River Lumber company at the time of his induction in April, 1941. Overseas for more than two years, he is a veteran of Guadalcanal and New Georgia campaigns, in which the 25th infantry division was largely instrumental in smashing Jap resistance.

Market at Reedsport Has Change of Owners

REEDSPORT J. E. Williams and R. A. Phelps today announced the sale of their Peoples market in this city, to G. R. Macdonald, who was formerly in the meat business at Vancouver and Camas, Wash. Mr. Macdonald took immediate possession and will move his family here from Vancouver. The deal included the one-story concrete building, together with all the cooling plant equipment and store fixtures.

Funds Apportioned To Douglas County School Districts

Mrs. Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent, reports that her office has been unusually busy the last few days making the apportionments to the districts of the state school support fund. The total this year amounts to \$124,490.61.

Because of the size of the Roseburg schools, district no. 4 received the largest check, which was \$30,494.84. The next largest apportionments were to Reedsport, \$12,433.77; Myrtle Creek, \$8,044.29; Glendale, \$6,543.37; Drain, \$6,198.54; Sutherlin, \$5,133.27; Yoncalla, \$4,858.65; Oakland, \$4,713.78; Elkton, \$3,832.50; Glide, \$3,219.17; Riddle, \$2,894.50; Canyonville, \$2,346.88; and Days Creek, \$910.80.

The non-high school district was eligible to receive \$6,526.44 but because no levy was made this year did not participate in the distribution and the funds it might otherwise have had were distributed to the other districts. Several districts made levies which called for less than the amount for which they were eligible and the excess was apportioned among the other districts. Since this fund is used as a real estate property offset, it is apportioned out to districts making levies and cannot exceed the amount of the levy.

The apportionment is made on the basis of actual days attended by pupils during the past year. The assessor deducts the amount apportioned from the levy voted by the district before extending the tax roll. The superintendent's office is now ready to submit the report on appropriations to the assessor.

This school support fund is derived from the excess in the state income taxes. Two years ago the diversion from the state income tax was voted by the people at the November election.
