Oregonians Buy More Insurance, Report Shows

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 23.—(AP)—All classes of insurance companies collected \$62,750,957 in premiums in Oregon in 1943, a 12.04 per cent gain over 1942, State Insurance Commissioner Seth B. Thompson said today in his annual report.

The increased business, he said, was caused by increased industrial activity.

He said that \$915,186,932 in life insurance was in force last year, a gain of \$70,383,902 over 1942. New life insurance written during the year totaled \$89,213,121, or 18 per cent more than was written in 1942.

Fire insurance companies, with \$10,918,301 in premiums collected last year, paid out \$4,460,300 in claims.

Speed Transport Output, Roosevelt Asks Workers

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 24.—(AP)—President Roosevelt yesterday appealed to Kaiser workers to speed production of the combat transports being built at Oregon Shipbuilding corporation here and at the Kaiser Vancouver yard.

In letters sent to the two plants, the president said the transports "will play a highly important part in the amphibious campaign of the Pacific" and urged that they be delivered "at the earliest possible moment."

Oregon Milling Plant Bought by Ohio Firm

THE DALLAS, Ore., Aug. 24.—(AP)—The United Mills of Graton, Ohio, has purchased the Pioneer Wasco Warehouse Milling Co., here, Ray F. Kelly, president of the local firm, said today.

The purchase includes grain elevators and warehouses. United Mills, a subsidiary of the Loos-Wiles Biscuit Co., plans on developing the local unit into a million dollar industry, Kelly said.

Italian Patriots Face Increased Penalty Threat

ROME, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Increasing severity of enemy treatment of Italian patriots harassing the Nazi rear areas in northern Italy was disclosed by the Eighth army's capture of an order from Colonel von Hofman, which decreed immediate shooting of anyone assisting the criminal and treacherous patriots by giving them food or lodging. He announced he would support "any officer who exceeds our customary degree of restraint in his choice of measures for dealing with the patriots," adding, "all civilians arrested in the course of reprisals against the patriots will be sent to concentration camps and shipped to Germany as laborers."

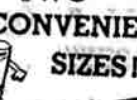
