the Paris area toward Germany's Metz-Arsonne gate, north of the Vosges hills. Another is pushing up from the Mediterranean toward the Belfort gate...

Our purpose is to close these gates and trap the Germans left in France.

FOR the Germans it is blitz war in reverse—and the Frankenstein monster that was created by the nazis is moving BACK TOWARD GERMANY far faster than it moved away from Germany through France in 1940.

HITLER can write off France as part of his loot that is lost. All that remains for him is to total up how much of his precious and dwindling manpower and how many of his machines of war will be lost with it.

FRANCE is ours, all but the mopping up—which will cost human blood, but whose final outcome is certain.

The next hot spot is the rocket coast. Hitler will fight for it with everything he has left in western Europe. With the robots destroying a general average of 700 English houses every hour, we may be expected to go after it with everything we have.

It may be significant that last night was the WORST NIGHT Britain has seen since the robots started. The nazis may be launching them with all the speed they can command before we take the nests.

MIGHTY Russian forces are driving toward Germany's borders from the east as inexorably as we are from the west. A FRESH Russian offensive is on in Romania, aimed apparently at knocking her out of the war and breaking Hitler's grip on the Balkans.

Two Russian armies are converging on the Galati gap between the Danube and the Carpathians. Back of the Galati gap lie Bucharest and the Ploesti oil fields.

Another Russian army is poised and ready to strike through the passes of the Carpathians down into the Hungarian valley of the Danube.

HITLER'S purpose, of course, is to get his forces back into the borders of Germany there to stand and fight.

But, suppose he does. For every mile that he shortens his lines we will shorten our lines an equivalent mile. Our planes, now busy over VAST AREAS, will mass in invincible armadas in the skies over Germany.

Our ground forces will be ready to pounce at every sign of weakness.

ONLY ONE ROAD OPEN

ANNOUNCING that the American Federation of Labor will use every influence to register and vote its membership at the forthcoming November elections, William Green, A. F. of L. president, repeats his declaration to affiliated unions that the national organization is not endorsing candidates nor parties.

There can be little argument that the declaration of the A. F. of L. president is in keeping with American tradition, but how will this attitude work out in practice?

The C. I. O. has placed its power unqualifiedly behind the New Deal. The C. I. O. political action committee is collecting assessments from union members to build up a fund specifically to re-elect Mr. Roosevelt. It does not matter that some C. I. O. members do not plan, individually, to support the president in his fourth term aspirations.

Sidney Hillman, PAC chairman, and Mr. Roosevelt are attempting to ride tandem on the New Deal amphibious horse.

The New Deal has a very clearly defined policy of rewarding its friends and punishing its enemies. It counts among its enemies all who do NOT work for the New Deal.

With the C. I. O. definitely in the saddle of the floundering horse, while the A. F. of L. sticks to the right of political self-determination, what will happen to the A. F. of L. if the fourth term aspirations are fulfilled?

Judging from the past actions of the administration, the C. I. O., if the president is reelected, will get all the breaks and the A. F. of L. will receive some rough treatment. It seems, therefore, that President Green's policy of non-endorsement, in effect, makes it incumbent upon A. F. of L. membership to oppose the New Deal as a matter of self-protection. It is quite apparent that when the C. I. O. raises a huge sum of money to aid in the campaign and conducts a house-to-house canvass throughout the nation on behalf of the New Deal, and the A. F. of L. limits its efforts merely to getting its membership to the polls to vote as it pleases, political favoritism will follow the Hillman-led factions.

We have been reading recently of a research organization which discounts the labor vote as an influence upon the outcome of the election. The researchers contend, and offer their proof, that the elections are controlled, very largely, by federal office holders. Because of the large number of persons on federal payroll, it is held the president can spot any opposing candidate more than ten million votes.

It is probably true that the labor vote is not as cohesive as leaders would like to believe, but we still feel that it is an important factor in any election. Organized labor represents a large portion of our population. It has a perfect right to engage in political dealings to protect and maintain rights and privileges gained for the workingman. Its unions are suitable places for political study and discussion.

In view of the results that may follow, President Green's hands-off policy is, in our opinion, a rather bold political stand. It now becomes the duty of the individual members and unions to determine their future course in keeping with traditional American custom. But it would seem from here that only one road is left open.

Spindel's Hitting Leads Seattle to Win Over Padres

(By the Associated Press.) Sparked by Catcher Spindel's at-bat work, Seattle swamped the San Diego Padres, 12 to 4, in a Pacific Coast league baseball game last night.

Spindel batted in 7 runs and scored twice on a triple, a double, a single and two walks. His first inning triple accounted for three tallies and a double in the second again cleared the bases.

Pitcher Babeich limited the Padres to six hits. Only one of the Padres' four runs was earned.

Los Angeles moved to an eight-game league lead over Hollywood when Prim handuffed the Stars with two hits for a 4 to 1 Angel win.

Sacramento bunched three of four hits gained off Portland's Peretti in the fifth inning to score twice and defeat the Beavers, 2 to 1. The tallies came in when Portland's Adams missed a throw at the plate.

The San Francisco Seals concentrated the greater part of a nine hit attack in the first four innings to defeat Oakland, 5 to 3.
