## News of 4-H CLUBS

The Brockway Livestock club, led by H. C. Schattnerker, held a tour and meeting Saturday evening, August 19. Each club member's project was visited and discussed. Warren Burks gave a fitting and showing demonstration on a dairy calf and also discussed the Willamette valley 4-H livestock and cross tour he attended recently. The group finished their tour at the Schattnerker ranch, where they were served ice cream by Mr. and Mrs. Schattnerker, Kenneth Minnick, county club agent, accompanied the group and showed a reel of 4-H club pictures that were taken of the different club projects in the county.
