Six New Books Offered by Library

Six new books received at the Roseburg Public Library this week are topped by one of W. Somerset Maugham's greatest novels, "The Razor's Edge," the story of a man who renounces the opportunity for wealth and position to seek knowledge and a faith transcending human mortality. How he achieves wisdom which gives him power over the material world is told in the impressive manner that characterizes all of the author's writings.

The Mediterranean island of Malta, known in 1942 as the most bombed spot in the world, is the locale of John Brophy's latest novel, "Target Island," another on the new book list. It is a story of courage and indestructible hope that ranks with the best narratives to come out of the present world war.

Those who like crime mystery stories will be entertained by Mary Pitt's novel, "Clues to Christobel." It's quite different from the ordinary novels of its type and, sure to please those who like ingenious plotting and startling tragedy.

The remaining three novels in the list are Westerns. One of them, "Wild Horse Shorty," by Nelson C. Nye, will be reissued more from its abundance of humor than from its "rough stuff" phases.
